Introduction

OhioHealth is a nationally recognized, not-for-profit, system of faith-based hospitals and healthcare organizations serving 50 Ohio counties. All OhioHealth entities are connected by (a) a mission to “improve the health of those we serve,” (b) core values of compassion, excellence, stewardship, integrity and inclusion, (c) cardinal value of “we honor the dignity and worth of each person”. OhioHealth’s vision is “to provide exceptional care for all through experiences that earn a lifetime of trust”.

OhioHealth has been recognized nationally for its world-class healthcare services. OhioHealth has been recognized by Fortune as one of the “100 Best Companies to Work For” from 2007-2021. (OhioHealth 2024). Great Place to Work® and PEOPLE magazine have honored OhioHealth as one of the 2021 PEOPLE Companies that Care® (OhioHealth 2024). In 2020, four OhioHealth hospitals, namely, Riverside Methodist Hospital, Grant Medical Center, Doctors Hospital and Dublin Methodist Hospital were named a 2020 LGBTQ Healthcare Equality Top Performer based on the 2020 Healthcare Equality Index (HEI) administered by the Human Rights Campaign (HRC). In 2020, OhioHealth was recognized as Great Place to Work – Certified™ based from the Great Place to Work® Trust Index™ survey.

In February 2021, the OhioHealth Inclusion Pledge was adopted throughout the health system. Each OhioHealth employee becomes a part of a culture that cares; one that supports one another; and honors the dignity and worth of each person. OhioHealth is committed to ensuring that the organization reflects the rich diversity of the communities we serve. We respect, embrace and derive strength from the ways that we are similar and the ways that we are different.

Located in Pickaway County, Ohio, OhioHealth Berger Hospital has served the community since 1930. OhioHealth Berger Hospital and its compassionate team of healthcare providers and support staff, provides top quality care to patients and families within their own local community. OhioHealth Berger Hospital, located at 600 N. Pickaway Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113, is an 83-bed hospital facility that offers adult medical and surgical care, an intensive care unit and labor and delivery services. OhioHealth Berger Hospital has 263 physicians on medical staff, and offers various surgical procedures, treatment options, therapies and primary care services. Outpatient services include laboratory services, computed tomography (CT) scanning, mammography, magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), x-ray, oncology and infusion services, and cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation programs. In Fiscal Year 2023, OhioHealth Berger Hospital had 2,826 inpatient admissions, 23,561 emergency department visits, 1,309 observations, 62,739 outpatient visits, 2,669 surgeries, and 308 births.

OhioHealth is dedicated to serving communities through its community benefit. In Fiscal Year 2023, OhioHealth provided a total \$468 million in Community Benefit, including \$107.7 million in charity care, \$254.7 million in net cost of Medicaid programs, \$67.2 million in net cost of medical education, \$0.9 million in subsidized health services, \$10.8 million toward community health services, \$25.7 million in cash and in-kind contributions, and \$1 million for research.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital has received various awards, recognitions related to excellent patient care, and the use of advance technology. Examples include the following:

- **Commission on Cancer Accreditation Associate Cancer Program 2023** – The Commission on Cancer (CoC), a program of the American College of Surgeons, recognizes cancer care programs for their commitment to providing comprehensive, high quality, and multidisciplinary patient centered care. Through the CoC, OhioHealth Berger Hospital has access to reporting tools to aid in benchmarking and improving outcomes. The Commission on cancer accredited the OhioHealth Berger Hospital as a Hospital Associate Cancer Program (American College of Surgeons, 1996-2024).
- **The Joint Commission Accreditation 2022 (Hospital)** – Joint Commission standards are the basis of an objective evaluation process that can help health care organizations measure, assess and improve performance. The standards focus on patient care and organization functions that are essential to providing safe, high-quality care. Earning their seal of accreditation is one of the highest honors a hospital can achieve. The Joint Commission provided the National Quality Approval to the OhioHealth Berger Hospital, OhioHealth Medical Offices (Pain Management, Imaging, Laboratory Services), Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT), Infusion Center, Wound Care, Medication Management Therapy Clinic, and OhioHealth Berger Rehabilitation Services (The Joint Commission, 2024).
- **Accreditation by the American Academy of Sleep Medicine** – The OhioHealth Berger Hospital Sleep Center is accredited by the American Academy of Sleep Medicine. OhioHealth Berger's accreditation demonstrates Berger Hospital's commitment to high quality, patient-centered care in the field of sleep medicine.
- **Accreditation by the American College of Radiology** – OhioHealth Berger Hospital's breast ultrasound, computed tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) and nuclear medicine are accredited by the American College of Radiology. The American College of Radiology offers access to the Appropriateness Criteria to enable providers to make appropriate imaging or treatment decisions, enhance quality of care, and enable efficient use of radiology interventions (American College of Radiology, n.d.).

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 requires not-for-profit hospitals to conduct a community health needs assessment (CHNA) once every three years (Internal Revenue Service, 2018). OhioHealth acquired Berger Hospital on April 1, 2019 and conducted the first CHNA for fiscal year ending June 30, 2021. The second OhioHealth Berger Hospital CHNA was conducted for fiscal year ending June 30, 2022 in order to align with the three-year interval established by the Internal Revenue Service. The third OhioHealth Berger Hospital CHNA was conducted for fiscal year ending June 30, 2025. Since the OhioHealth Berger Hospital representatives actively participated in the conduct of the 2023 Pickaway County Community Health Assessment, primary and secondary data, findings, and community stakeholder participation from the 2023 Pickaway County Community Health Assessment will be adopted in the 2025 OhioHealth Berger Hospital Community Health Needs Assessment.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital collaborated with the Pickaway County Public Health and various community stakeholders to identify the significant community health needs in Pickaway County and to determine the priority health needs that will be addressed in the Fiscal Year 2026-2028 OhioHealth Berger Hospital Implementation Strategy to Address Community Health Needs. This CHNA report for fiscal year ending June 30, 2025 identifies the process, participants, and significant health needs of the community and reports the impacts of actions that were identified in the Fiscal Year 2023-2025 Implementation Strategy to address community health needs.

Analysis of internal OhioHealth data showed that Pickaway County is the community served by Berger Hospital. In Fiscal Year 2022, 54% of patients served by OhioHealth Berger Hospital reside in Pickaway County. In Fiscal Year 2023, 56% of patients served by OhioHealth Berger Hospital and various facilities reside in Pickaway County. Refer to Table 1.

C. Existing Healthcare Facilities and Resources within the Community Available to Respond to the Community's Health Needs

C – 1. Examples of Healthcare Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Pickaway County's Priority Health Needs that include Substance Use, Health Care Access, and Mental Health Care Access

Apart from addressing substance use, health care access and mental health care access, these facilities and community resources may also address other significant health needs that include mental health stigma, adverse childhood experiences (ACE), and social determinants of health (lack of access to transportation, housing, food, jobs, and internet).

C – 1.1. OhioHealth and OhioHealth Berger Hospital

- C – 1.1.1. Inpatient Behavioral and Mental Health Care Services** – OhioHealth facilities offer patients with mental and behavioral challenges an array of therapeutic services that accommodate many patients. Inpatient care is often recommended when the emotional, psychological and behavioral problems have reached a crisis and the patient needs a safe environment to stabilize. As the crisis is addressed, the team assesses the need for follow-up outpatient care and puts a plan in place to support the patient's continued recovery. Services include medication management, group therapy and activities, electroconvulsive therapy (ECT), further consultation, and education (OhioHealth, 2024).

At OhioHealth, the Inpatient Behavioral Health Services are offered at the following hospitals:

- **OhioHealth Riverside Methodist Hospital** – located at 3535 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214
- **OhioHealth Marion General Hospital** – located at 1000 McKinley Park Drive, Marion, Ohio 43302
- **OhioHealth Mansfield Hospital** – located at 335 Glessner Avenue, Mansfield, Ohio 44903

As part of its Inpatient Behavioral Health Services, OhioHealth offers the following interventions to address the behavioral and mental health needs of patients at the inpatient setting:

- **Electroconvulsive Therapy (ECT)** – ECT is a safe and effective treatment for some psychiatric disorders. We use it to treat depression, but it is also effective with other mood disorders, such as bipolar disorder. Before a patient receives their first treatment, they will create a treatment plan with their physician team to determine that ECT is the appropriate form of treatment. The total number of treatments needed to successfully treat severe depression will vary based on age, diagnosis, history of the illness, family support and response to treatment. Most people require six to twelve treatments and may notice a difference after two to four depending on the severity of their illness.

- **Psychiatric Emergency Services** – a psychiatric assessment and evaluation, is available to patients receiving care at OhioHealth Emergency Departments.
- **Inpatient Consultation/Liaison Services** – Physicians may request a psychiatric assessment and evaluation for medical patients with psychiatric complications who are currently receiving inpatient hospital care. A psychiatrist, advance practice nurse or a licensed independent social worker (LISW) will evaluate the patient, make recommendations for treatment, and follow the patient's course of care until he/she is stabilized.

At OhioHealth Berger Hospital when patients present with mental health conditions, they are assessed by a provider. Based on the patient's condition, appropriate referrals are made to area mental health service providers such as but not limited to Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health Center, Pickaway Area Recovery Services, Mental Health America of Ohio, Perinatal Outreach and Encouragement for Moms (POEM), local counseling providers and other area hospitals as necessary.

C-1.1.2. OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Services – OhioHealth offers its patients various interventions and services such as but not limited to (a) Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation Therapy (TMS); (b) Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP); (c) Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP); (d) After Care Program; (e) Behavioral Health Outpatient Consultation/Transition Services; (f) Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO); and (g) Mindfulness Program (OhioHealth, 2024).

The OhioHealth outpatient behavioral health services are provided at the following clinics and offices:

- **OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Offices – Central Ohio** – located at 3820 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214. Services include (a) Partial Hospitalization Program and Intensive Outpatient Program, (b) Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO) Rape Helpline, and (c) Mindfulness Based Stress Reduction Program.
- **OhioHealth Marion General Hospital Behavioral Health** – located at 1000 McKinley Park Drive, Marion, Ohio 43302. Services include (a) Partial Hospitalization Program and Intensive Outpatient Program, and (b) Aftercare Program.
- **OhioHealth Mansfield Hospital Behavioral Health** – located at 335 Glessner Avenue, Mansfield, Ohio 44903. This Office offers Partial Hospitalization Program and Intensive Outpatient Program

Interventions that are provided at the OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Services include but not limited to:

- **Access to Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation Therapy (TMS)** – TMS Therapy uses highly focused magnetic pulses to stimulate the areas of the brain thought to control mood. The theory is that TMS Therapy causes neurons to become active, leading to the release of neurotransmitters to relieve symptoms of depression. Each outpatient treatment involves gentle placement of the magnetic coil against the patient's head. TMS Therapy utilizes a technology similar to Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) that has a long-term record of safety.
- **Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP)** – The Partial Hospitalization Program is used either as a step down from inpatient care or to help prevent hospitalization for outpatients experiencing more acute symptoms. PHP is structured treatment in a group setting designed to treat adults with symptoms of depression, anxiety, and/or thought disorganization that are affecting their ability to function in multiple areas of their lives. The goal of this program is to stabilize the acute symptoms and help people return to more normal levels of functioning. Patients attend the program five days per week, up to six hours per day. Length of stay varies and is determined by individual needs.

- **Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP)** – The Intensive Outpatient Program may serve as a step down from inpatient care or PHP, or for outpatients needing more intensive care than office visits. Depression, anxiety, and/or thought disorganization are the symptoms addressed in the group treatment format. The focus is on helping patients better understand their diagnosis, manage symptoms, increase functioning, and prevent relapse. Patients attend three or four days per week for up to four hours per day. Length of stay varies and is determined by individual needs.
- **AfterCare Program** – OhioHealth Marion General Hospital offers two aftercare programs. On Wednesdays, two-hour aftercare group supports those in the community with severe, persistent mental illness by helping them manage symptoms and maintain / increase functioning in the community. Lengths of stay are open ended. On Thursdays, two-hour aftercare group focuses primarily on relapse prevention. Patients often attend as a step down from our Partial Hospitalization or Intensive Outpatient Programs. Attendance is limited to a maximum of 12 weeks.
- **Behavioral Health Outpatient Consultation/Transition Services** – These services are for patients who are awaiting placement with an ongoing physician for their behavioral health needs or for consultation. This service only accepts referrals from within OhioHealth.
- **Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO)** – SARNCO is a rape crisis intervention and prevention program providing advocacy and emotional support in conjunction with medical and social services at OhioHealth Emergency Departments and other facilities in central Ohio. SARNCO also provides community outreach and prevention. SARNCO's 24-Hour Rape Helpline is (614) 267-7020. OhioHealth also supports survivors across the state via the Ohio Sexual Violence Helpline at (844) OHIO-HELP. The OhioHealth Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO) also offers evidence collection examinations to survivors in local Emergency Departments.
- **Mindfulness Program** – The Mindfulness program at OhioHealth is a highly-effective and extensively researched program offering relief from stress-related symptoms, and promoting enhanced well-being and peace of mind. OhioHealth offers an eight-week and abbreviated "short course" to help anyone who wants support coping with real life challenges such as anxiety, depression, stress, serious illnesses and more.
- **Free Behavioral Health Family Support Groups** – The Support Groups for family and friends of mental and behavioral health patients enable open and non-judgmental sharing and discussion of challenges, support and information and tips on navigating the behavioral and mental health system.

C – 1.2. Adena Health System

Adena Health System offers an array of behavioral health related services. Most notable of which are medication management programs, psychological services, and various counseling services that optimized for addiction and mental health, recovery and mental health education (Adena Health System, 2009-2024). Adena Health offers access to the Emergency Department Intercept and Navigation to Support (EDINS) where patients who are seen at the Emergency Department or admitted at the inpatient setting who manifest signs of substance use disorder are linked with a coordinator who helps patients access community resources. The EDINS program is part of Adena Health's "Breaking the Stigma" initiative (Adena Health System, 2009-2024).

C – 1.3. PrimaryOne Health Circleville and South High St.

PrimaryOne Health Circleville is located at 600 N. Pickaway St., Suite 300, Circleville, Ohio 43113. PrimaryOne Health South High Street is located at 3781 South High St., Columbus, Ohio 43207. These facilities offer patients with behavioral and mental care that is complementary to medical treatment for patients. This includes programs that help individuals with stress, addiction, depression, anxiety, smoking, overeating and any other emotional and social concerns (PrimaryOne Health, 2024).

C – 1.4. Nationwide Children's Hospital Big Lots Behavioral Health Services

The Nationwide Children's Hospital Big Lots Behavioral Health Services is located in 655 East Livingston Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43205. Programs and services include (a) psychiatry, (b) developmental and behavioral pediatrics, (c) Child Development Center and Center for Autism Spectrum Disorders, (d) pediatric psychology and neuropsychology, (e) crisis services, (f) inpatient services, (g) community-based services, (h) outpatient services, (i) prevention services (Nationwide Children's Hospital, 2024).

C – 1.4.1. Crisis Services (Nationwide Children's Hospital, 2024) –

- **Franklin County Youth Psychiatric Crisis Line** – calls are answered by a licensed therapist who will address the immediate psychiatric concern. The patient may be directed to the Emergency Department or local crisis center depending on the level of care that is needed.
- **Youth Crisis Stabilization Unit (YCSU)** – a 16-bed unit that provides multidisciplinary behavioral Health team consisting of masters prepared clinicians, psychiatrist, nursing, parent support specialists and therapeutic recreation team members. The facility offers length of stay for 3 to 5 days. The YCSU addresses the crisis immediately following the patient's admission through interaction with parents or guardians.
- **Critical Assessment and Treatment** – implemented with the patient's life is in danger or there is a chance for violence. An urgent assessment is done to determine the level of care, safety planning, and referral to ongoing provider. The licensed therapist has specific training in suicide assessment and crisis intervention and able to assess patients risk for harm and provide safety measures and determine appropriate level of care.
- **Psychiatric Crisis Department** – provides emergency psychiatric care to children and adolescents who had injuries, bleeding, lack of consciousness, swallowed a foreign object, overdosed, chest pains and difficulty breathing, and seizures.

C – 1.4.2. Community-Based and School-Based Services – includes programs such as but not limited to (a) Behavioral Health Juvenile Justice Program, (b) Care Connection (school-based services), (c) Early Childhood Mental Health Program, (d) Family Based Intensive Treatment, (e) Home-Based Team, (f) Integrated Family and Systems Treatment, and (g) Treatment for Healthy Alternatives (Nationwide Children's Hospital, 2024).

C – 1.4.3. Child Development Center (CDC) and Center for Autism Spectrum Disorders (CASD) – offers interdisciplinary assessment, treatment and consultation of children with intellectual and developmental disabilities and children with autism spectrum disorders (Nationwide Children's Hospital, 2024).

C – 1.4.4. Outpatient Services – offers Intensive Outpatient and Partial Hospitalization Programs, Mood and Anxiety Program, and Eating Disorders Program (Nationwide Children's Hospital, 2024).

C – 1.5. Pickaway Area Recovery Services, Inc. (PARS)

The Pickaway Area Recovery Services, Inc. (PARS) is located in 110 Highland Avenue, Circleville, Ohio 43113. PARS offers outpatient, intensive outpatient, and residential treatment for mental and behavioral health needs, prevention services and family support. PARS serves people with alcohol and drug issues using the cognitive-behavioral therapy, motivational interviewing, and matrix curriculum. Outpatient services include assessments, gambling addiction services, intensive outpatient services, education, medically assisted treatment with Vivitrol, driver intervention, prevention services, and legal advice. The Pickaway Women's Residential provides services for persons with alcohol and drug addiction and those with dual diagnosis (Pickaway Area Recovery Services, 2024).

C – 1.6. Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health Center Pickaway County Office

The Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health Center Pickaway County Office is located in 319 Logan Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health Center provides outpatient and residential services to take care of people suffering from alcohol and drug abuse. The Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health offers onsite pharmacy, counseling, primary care, medication-assisted treatment (MAT), day treatment and a crisis hotline (Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health Center, n.d.).

C – 1.7. Haven House of Pickaway County Inc.

The Haven House of Pickaway County Inc. is located at 111 Island Road, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The center's focus is domestic violence and offers programs that help individuals deal with domestic violence and homelessness. This includes crisis intervention, counseling, support groups, case management, legal advocacy, and community referrals.(Haven House of Pickaway County, Inc. n.d.).

C – 1.8. Chillicothe Veterans Affairs Medical Center Substance Abuse Treatment Program

The VA Chillicothe Health Care System is located in 17273 State Route 104, Chillicothe, Ohio 45601. The Veterans Affairs Medical Center offers detoxification, substance use treatment and treatment for mental illness and substance use disorders in inpatient, outpatient and residential settings. The STRONG Veterans Act that was signed into law in December 2022 strengthens mental health and suicide prevention programs through increased training, outreach, delivery and research of mental health services (U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, n.d.).

C – 1.9. Pickaway County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA)

The Pickaway County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) is located at 207 South Court Street, Circleville, OH 43113. This office offers abused and neglected children the chance to be connected with a court-appointed volunteer advocate. CASA can help children who have stayed at foster homes for extended periods of time. Their main mission is to help the children who are victims of abuse and neglect by acting as “a voice in court” (Pickaway County, 2024).

C – 1.10. New Source Counseling Center at Circleville, Ohio

The New Source Counseling Center at Circleville, Ohio is located at 214 South Court Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The New Source Counseling Center holds parenting workshops and counseling services that include individual, marriage and family counseling. It also provides management and life coaching services (New Source Counseling Centers, n.d.). Services include (but not limited to): (a) adult children of alcoholics, co-dependency, alcohol/chemical dependency, other addictions, (b) anxiety, stress management, excessive fear, obsessions and compulsions, (c) chronic illness, terminal illness, (d) depression, (e) eating disorders, (f) grief, life transitions, (g) low self-esteem, (h) marital, pre-marital divorce recovery and other relationship concerns. Overall, the New Source Counseling Center offers psychological, social and spiritual needs through counseling and education of individuals, couples and families (New Source Counseling Centers, n.d.).

C – 1.11. Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities

The Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities is located at 200 E. High Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities provides residential services, health and respite, employment services, access to resources to people with developmental disabilities who lives in Pickaway County (Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities, 2023). The Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities also provides early intervention such as the PLAY Project for children with autism (Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities, 2023).

C – 1.12. Pickaway County Job and Family Services

The Pickaway County Job and Family Services is located at 1005 S. Pickaway St., Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Pickaway County Job and Family Services provides children services, child support, adult and family services, employment services (Ohio MeansJobs-Pickaway), protective services and community engagement (Pickaway County Job and Family Services, 2022). The Adult and Family Services Division provides financial and support services such as Ohio WorksFirst, Prevention, Retention, and Contingency Program, food assistance and access to Medicaid (Pickaway County Job and Family Services, 2022).

C – 1.13. Pickaway Addiction Action Coalition (PAAC)

The Pickaway Addiction Action Coalition (PAAC) is located at 469 E. Ohio St., Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Pickaway Addiction Action Coalition consist of a multidisciplinary group of parents, law enforcement, and other community stakeholders who are passionate in prevention, treatment and recovery awareness among Pickaway County residents (Pickaway Addiction Action Coalition, n.d.). In 2022, The Pickaway Addiction Action Coalition was awarded \$625,000 from the Drug-Free Communities Program, which is initiated by the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy and managed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2024). The funds will be available from 2022-2027 to the PAAC to mobilize leaders in Pickaway County to identify and respond to the drug problems within Pickaway County by managing environmental conditions related to substance use. Matching funds for PAAC's Drug-Free communities award are being provided by long-time community partners such as OhioHealth, Adena Health System, Pickaway County Commissioners, and the Well being Fund (Collins, 2023).

C – 2. Examples of Healthcare Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Health Care Access, including Limited Providers, Limited Capacity for Maternal, Reproductive, and Menopausal Care and Low Cancer Screening Rates.

Apart from addressing health care access, these facilities and community resources may also address other significant health needs that were identified by the community stakeholders such as access to physical activity and social determinants of health (access to transportation, food insecurity, housing, and job).

C – 2.1. OhioHealth and OhioHealth Berger Hospital

- **Cancer Care** – prevention, screening, diagnosis, treatment, and survivorship. Cancer programs and services include (a) blood and marrow transplant, (b) breast cancer, (c) cancer rehabilitation, (d) cardio-oncology, (e) colorectal cancer, (f) gastrointestinal surgical oncology, (g) gynecologic cancer, (h) interventional radiology, (i) lung cancer, (j) medical oncology, (k) precision medicine, (l) prostate cancer, (m) radiation oncology, (n) skin cancer, (o) survivorship and supportive care.
- **OPG Medical Oncology and Hematology** – located at 600 N Pickaway Street, Suite 203, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG Medical Oncology and Hematology provides evaluations and treatment for hematology and cancer patients. The OPG Cancer physicians are experts at diagnosing and treating more than 50 types of cancer. Patients have access to the latest technology, research, patient navigation and integrative care.
- **Bradley Cancer Center** – located at 600 N Pickaway Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. Services at the Bradley Cancer Center include (a) cancer care and infusion, (b) laboratory services, and (c) patient navigation. The patients also have access to cancer supportive care and wellness, including support services, integrative medicine, cancer rehabilitation, cancer wellness and genetic counseling.
- **OPG Obstetrics and Gynecology Circleville N Pickaway St.** – located at 600 N Pickaway Street, 2nd floor, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG Obstetrics and Gynecology clinic provides expert obstetric and gynecologic care in a warm, personalized environment. Women’s services include annual check-ups, pregnancy care, postpartum care, gynecology care, and menopausal care.
- **Maternity Care** – offers patients with state-of-the-art pain management services and home-like labor, delivery, recovery and postpartum suites and comprehensive education services. Expectant mothers and other caregivers or companions are offered classes that teach about (a) breastfeeding essentials, (b) comforting a baby, (c) infant care and lifesaving skills, (d) infant sign language, (e) lactation support, and (f) pain control options during delivery.
- **Primary Care Services.** The primary care providers offer reliable, convenient care for minor illnesses and injuries to the routine management of chronic health conditions such as diabetes or asthma. The primary care clinics include:
 - + **OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care Circleville Sharon Road** – located at 210 Sharon Rd, Suite D, Circleville, Ohio 43113.
 - + **OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care Circleville N. Court St** – located at 1180 N Court St, Suite A, Circleville, Ohio 43113.
 - + **OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care W. Main St.** – located at 299 W. Main St, Ashville, Ohio 43103.
 - + **OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care Southern St** – located at 9085 Southern Avenue, Orient, Ohio 43146

- **Diabetes care** – personalized diabetes treatment programs for Type 1, Type 2 and gestational diabetes. OhioHealth provides services related to diabetes such as (a) foot and ankle care, (b) diabetes classes, (c) surgical or medical weight loss, and (d) support groups
- **Ear, Nose and Throat** – provides comprehensive care for disorders of the ear, nose, throat and related areas in the head and neck affecting children and adults
- **Electronic Intensive Care Unit (eICU)** – board-certified intensivists (physicians who specialize in caring for critically ill patients) work in a control center instead of patients' rooms. They observe the patient's progress minute by minute, 24/7, using video, audio and vital sign monitors. This kind of constant observation can pick up small changes in the patient's status. When that happens, the eICU intensivist alerts our ICU physicians and nurses, who take corrective action right away. Studies show that this close monitoring and quick response saves lives, reduces complications and helps patients recover faster.
- **Heart and Vascular Care** – offers patients access to latest treatments, patient-centered team, best quality care locally, and better health outcomes. OhioHealth offers advanced cardiac imaging, cardiac rehabilitation, weight management support, and women's heart health services. OhioHealth's Heart and Vascular Programs include (a) Antiarrhythmic Clinics, (b) Cardiac Imaging, (c) Cardiac Rehabilitation, (d) Cardiothoracic Surgery, (e) Clinical Cardiology, (f) Electrophysiology, and (g) heart disease prevention.
- **Medication Therapy Management** – offers patients safe management of their blood thinning therapy and personalized treatment plan
- **Pain Management** – offers patients access to treatments such as (a) celiac plexus block, (b) epidural steroid injection, (c) facet joint injection, (d) intraspinal drug therapy and spinal cord stimulation, (e) lumbar sympathetic block, (f) myoneural injection (with or without botox), (g) nucleoplasty, (h) radiofrequency ablation, (i) selective nerve root block, and (j) stellate ganglion block.
- **Berger Hospital Emergency Department** – located at 600 N. Pickaway Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Berger Hospital Emergency Department provide immediate, expert treatment for emergencies, including severe and life-threatening conditions. Examples of emergency conditions include (a) abdominal pain or injury, (b) blood pressure concerns, (c) blood sugar concerns, (d) chest pain or injury, (e) possible blood clot, (f) confusion or changes in mental function, unexplained drowsiness or disorientation, (g) coughing up blood, (h) dehydration, (i) difficulty breathing, (j) eye pain with sudden visual changes, (k) fainting or passing out, (l) head pain, or sudden onset or change in headache or migraine pattern, (m) fast or irregular beating of the heart, (n) kidney stones, (o) light-headedness, (p) limb swelling without injury, (q) major animal bite, (r) major burns, (s) major cuts, (t) obstetrics emergencies more than 16 weeks pregnancy, (u) persistent dizziness, (v) poisoning, (w) rectal bleeding, (x) severe allergies, (y) severe head injury, (z) sexual assault
- **Imaging Services- Circleville** – located at 1434 Circleville Plaza Drive, Circleville, Ohio 43113. This Imaging service utilizes the most advanced equipment for outpatient radiology diagnostics.
- **Laboratory Services** – located at 1434 Circleville Plaza Drive, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Laboratory Services perform blood work and other laboratory tests
- **Urgent Care Circleville** – located at 1434 Circleville Plaza Drive, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The urgent care Circleville provides care for patients with minor illnesses and injuries such as but not limited to (a) animal and insect bites and stings, (b) asthma flare-up, (c) cold, flu or COVID-19 symptoms, (d) cuts, bruises and those that may need stitches, (e) earache and infection, (f) minor injuries, (g) minor allergic reactions, (h) minor burns, (i) nausea, vomiting or diarrhea, (j) minor nosebleeds, (k) pink eye, (l) rashes, (m) sexually transmitted infections with symptoms, (n) sprains and strains, (o) suture or staple removal, (p) urinary, kidney and bladder infections, (q) wound check, (r) drug screenings, (s) physical exams, (t) select immunizations, and (u) select laboratory testing.

- **Berger Health Center** – located at 210 Sharon Road, Circleville, Ohio 43113. Services at the Berger Health Center include (a) wound care, (b) pain management, (c) hyperbaric oxygen therapy, (d) primary care, and employee convenience care clinic.
- **OhioHealth Physician Group (OPG) Pain Management** – located at 210 Sharon Road, Suite 1, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG Pain Management clinic serves patients with ongoing pain after a trauma, accident or injury, or surgery or other complex conditions.

Services include but not limited to (a) autonomic nerve blocks for cancer pain and complex regional pain syndrome (CRPS); (b) interventional pain medicine; (c) interventional treatment of headaches and facial pain; (d) soft tissue pain disorder; (e) electromyography; (f) musculoskeletal medicine; (g) pain management; (h) spinal cord stimulation system.

Procedures include but not limited to (a) Botox treatment; (b) dorsal root ganglion stimulation system implantation; (c) image guided pain relief injections; (d) interventional pain procedures; (e) intrathecal targeted drug delivery system implantation; (f) kyphoplasty and vertebroplasty; (g) lumbar puncture; (h) peripheral nerve blocks and joint injections; and (i) peripheral nerve stimulation system implantation.

- **WorkHealth Circleville** – located at 210 Sharon Road, Suite B, Circleville, Ohio 43113. WorkHealth Circleville is a hospital-based, occupational health clinic serving Pickaway County. WorkHealth Circleville offers employees cost-effective regulatory physical exams as well as work-related injury care. Moreover, it promotes occupational health and safety services to help employees return to work in a timely fashion, steering them to the proper level of medical care and minimizing more expensive emergency department or urgent care visits.
- **Anticoagulation Clinic – Berger Hospital** – located at 600 N Pickaway Street, Room B90, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Anticoagulation Clinic provides education and personalized care surrounding management of medicines that prevent blood clots.
- **OPG General Surgery** – located at 600 N Pickaway Street, Suite 203, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG General Surgery offers patients access to modern surgical techniques, including laparoscopic, minimally invasive and robotic procedures. Surgeons work with patients to develop a treatment plan that yields good outcomes, short hospital stay, properly managed pain, and faster return to normal activity.
- **OhioHealth Sleep Services-Circleville** – located at 600 N Pickaway Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OhioHealth Sleep Services provides care for patients with sleep disorders. The Sleep Center is staffed by board-certified physicians. The Sleep Center is accredited by the American Academy of Sleep Medicine.
- **OPG Pulmonology Circleville** – located at 600 N Pickaway St # 204, Circleville, OH 43113. The OPG Pulmonology Circleville diagnose and treat lung and pulmonary disorders, such as but not limited to asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), pulmonary fibrosis, and sleep disorders.
- **OPG Neuroscience Circleville 600 N Pickaway St Suite 200** – located at 600 N Pickaway St, Suite 200, Circleville, Ohio 43113. Neurology P\physicians and specialists diagnose and treat various neurological disorders.

Neurodiagnostic testing include but not limited to (a) electromyography (EMG) exam to determine the muscle response or electrical activity in response to a nerve stimulation; (b) skin biopsy, (c) spinal fluid analysis, (d) ultrasound of peripheral nerve and muscle, (e) neuropsychological testing, (f) computed tomography (CT), (g) magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), (h) duplex ultrasound, (i) digital subtraction angiography, (j) carotid ultrasound, (k) transcranial doppler to provide real-time assessment of the brain; (l) outpatient electroencephalogram (EEG) to record brain activity; (m) epilepsy neuroimaging; (n) confirmation of epilepsy diagnosis, (o) presurgical evaluation, (o) epilepsy monitoring.

Spine care specialists provides education of the spine condition and treatment for (a) back pain, (b) cervical/thoracic/lumbar disc herniation, (c) complex spine, (d) herniated cervical disc, (e) herniated lumbar disc, (f) kyphosis, (g) neck pain, (h) radiculopathy, (i) sciatica, (j) scoliosis, (k) spinal cord, (l) spinal stenosis, (m) spinal arthritis, (n) spine fractures, (o) spine injections, (p) vertebral augmentation, and (q) vertebral compression fractures.

Spine surgery provides access to conditions such as but not limited to (a) cervical spine fusions, (b) decompression, (c) discectomy, (d) image-guided spine surgery, (e) lumbar spine fusions; (f) minimally invasive spine surgery, (g) revision spine surgery, (h) spinal cord stimulation, (i) spinal cord tumors, and (j) spinal fusions.

- **OPG Urology Circleville** – located at 600 N Pickaway St., Suite 402, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG Urology Circleville diagnose and treat conditions such as but not limited to infertility, impotence, incontinence, cancer and chronic pelvic pain. The physicians perform vasectomies, pelvic flood reconstruction and sex reassignment surgery. Board-certified physicians use the da Vinci robotic surgical system that leads to shorter hospital stays and faster recovery.
- **OPG Heart and Vascular** – located at 600 N Pickaway St., Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG Heart and Vascular Clinic diagnose, and treat peripheral vascular disease, (b) heart failure, and heart valve diseases. The Clinic provides referrals for cardiothoracic surgery, electrophysiology, heart failure, and interventional cardiology to other OhioHealth Heart and Vascular Clinics as needed.

Cardiac Imaging. Cardiac imaging and tests include (a) cardiovascular computed tomography (CT) angiography; (b) Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), (c) cardiovascular magnetic resonance imaging; (d) cardiac positron emission tomography (PET); (e) dobutamine stress echocardiogram; (f) echocardiogram; (g) Electrocardiogram; (h) exercise stress echocardiogram; (i) exercise stress tests; (j) coronary calcium scoring; (k) transesophageal echocardiogram; and (l) nuclear imaging.

Cardiothoracic surgery. Procedures and treatments related to cardiothoracic surgery include (a) advanced heart failure procedures; (b) aortic aneurysm repair; (c) aortic valve replacement; (d) arrhythmia surgery; (e) atrial septal defect/patent foramen ovale (PFO) closure; (f) coronary artery bypass grafting; (g) endovascular treatment of complex vascular disorders; (h) esophageal surgery; (i) lung surgery; (j) mitral valve repair and/or replacement; (k) tricuspid valve repair and/or replacement; (l) ventricular assist devices.

Electrophysiology. Tests, diagnostics, procedures and treatments for electrophysiology studies include but not limited to (a) Mobile cardiac outpatient telemetry; (b) cardiac event monitors; (c) Holter monitors; (d) Tilt-table testing; (e) electrophysiology studies; (f) device transtelephonic monitoring; (g) device interrogation and programming. The procedures and treatments for patients include (a) radiofrequency catheter ablation; (b) cryoballoon catheter ablation; (c) Implantable cardioverter defibrillator implantation; (d) cardiac resynchronization device implantation; (e) permanent pacemaker implantation; (f) implantable event monitors; (n) lead extraction; (o) direct current cardioversion; and (p) left atrial appendage closure.

Heart failure. Tests, diagnostics, for heart failure include but not limited to: (a) Testing for cardiomyopathies; (b) cardiopulmonary exercise testing. Procedures and treatments for heart failure include (a) invasive hemodynamics/cardiac catheterization; (b) advanced heart failure evaluation and treatment; (c) cardiac transplant evaluation; (d) cardiac transplant (post-surgery) management; (e) Left ventricular Assist Device (LVAD) evaluation, implantation, and management; (f) heart failure medication optimization; (g) dietary counseling; (h) heart failure-related social services; (i) genetic counseling; and (j) palliative care/hospice consultative services.

Interventional cardiology. Tests, diagnostics within interventional cardiology include but not limited to: (a) Coronary angiography; (b) diagnostic cardiac catheterization; (c) transradial coronary angiography. Procedures and treatments related to Interventional Cardiology include (a) angioplasty atherectomy; (b) balloon valvuloplasty; (c) coronary stenting; (d) extracorporeal membrane oxygenation (ECMO); (e) femoral access; (f) Impella intra-aortic balloon pump; (g) mitra-clip; (h) percutaneous coronary intervention (radial access); (h) stenting; (i) transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR)

- **OPG Orthopedic Surgery and Sports Medicine Circleville** located at 130 Morris Road, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The OPG Orthopedic Surgery and Sports Medicine Clinic offers preventive care services, physical examinations, rehabilitation therapy, immunizations and treatments for sports-related injuries.
- **Rehabilitation Services- Circleville** located at 1280 N Court St, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Rehabilitation Services Circleville provides individualized treatment plans for reducing pain, improving function, and mobility and returning to an active lifestyle. Services include but not limited to (a) physical therapy; (b) occupational therapy; (c) speech therapy; (d) pediatric therapy; (e) Hand and Kinesio Taping® Method; (f) neurological therapy; (g) vestibular and sports medicine rehabilitation; (h) orthopedic and joint care; (i) lymphedema management; and (j) functional capacity evaluations.

C – 2.2. Adena Health System

Adena Health System offers Outpatient Nutrition Services where a registered dietitian reviews a patient's medical history, assesses eating and exercise habits, and collaborates with the patient in developing realistic goals to help make long-term lifestyle changes (Adena Health System, 2009-2024). Additionally, Adena Health System has a weight management clinic at the Adena Family Medicine Circleville. They help patients achieve healthy lifestyle habits. The Weight Management Clinic helps post-bariatric surgery patients from The Ohio State Wexner Medical Center manage their lifestyle after surgery (Adena Health System, 2009-2024).

C – 2.3. PrimaryOne Health Circleville and South High St.

PrimaryOne Health's Circleville clinic is at 600 N. Pickaway St., Suite 300, Circleville, Ohio 43113. PrimaryOne Health's South High Street clinic is at 3781 South High Street, Columbus, Ohio 43207. PrimaryOne Health clinics offer primary care services for immunizations, well-baby and child check-up, physical examination, sick visits, blood pressure checks, glucose screenings, sports physicals, flu shots and other comprehensive primary care services. Adult medicine includes management of diabetes, high blood pressure, preventative care, and other chronic diseases. PrimaryOne also provides healthcare for the homeless services that includes primary care and other services (PrimaryOne Health, 2024).

C – 2.4. Pickaway County Community Action Organization (PICCA)

The Pickaway County Community Action Organization (PICCA) is located at 469 E. Ohio Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. PICCA provides the following services below (Pickaway County Community Action Agency, n.d.):

- **Early childhood services** – include Head Start, Early Head Start, and Safe Kids: Car Seats
- **Empowerment services** – include education and training, fresh produce market, mobility management, representative payee program, toys for tots, and wheels to work
- **Energy outreach services** – include Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP), and weatherization and home repair
- **Homeless services** – include emergency food and shelter, and transitional housing
- **Housing services** – management of 3 housing complexes with 95 units
- **Transportation services** – include access to Pickaway Area Rural Transit that offers public routes such as demand response, immediate response, Columbus shuttle, Circleville flex bus

C – 2.5. Pickaway County Community Foundation

The Pickaway County Community Foundation is located at 770 North Court Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113. The Pickaway County Community Foundation supports programs that address food insecurity such as food collection, strengthening agriculture opportunities including grant operation, livestock operation, sod farms, berry farms, and bee-keeping (The Pickaway County Community Foundation, 2024).

C – 2.6. Pickaway County Family YMCA

The Pickaway County Family YMCA is located at 440 Nicholas Drive, Circleville, Ohio 43113. Examples of what the Family YMCA offers to the community include (but not limited to):

- **Health and fitness** – include access to a gym, pool, whirlpool, sauna, (b) fully equipped fitness center, (c) training equipment, (d) walking or running track, (e) family activity center, (f) before and after school care, (g) group fitness classes, (h) personal training, and (i) water fitness. Health and fitness programs are available for families, kids and teens, older adults (YMCA of Central Ohio, 2024).
- **Swimming activities** – include (a) learning how to swim, (b) improving strokes, (c) competitive swimming, (d) water exercise classes, (e) access to certified swimming instructors and lifeguards (YMCA of Central Ohio, 2024).
- **Early childhood programs** – include (a) early learning centers, (b) preschool programs, (c) Head Start, (d) Free Child Watch and Kids Time, (e) Summer only Kindergarten Jump Start, and (f) Early Childhood Resource Network that serves families and children who had special health care needs and developmental disabilities and delays (YMCA of Central Ohio, 2024).
- **Family support program** – include adaptive kayaking and canoeing, hiking, play groups, and education sessions (YMCA of Central Ohio, 2024).
- **Equipment loan program** – include 90-day loan periods for adaptive equipment such as walkers, bolsters, feeding chairs, sensory devices (YMCA of Central Ohio, 2024)
- **Early Intervention (formerly Ohio's Help Me Grow program)** – include services for children from birth to 3 years of age who are medically fragile have delays or disabilities. The Early Intervention conducts standardized evaluations, assessments, and therapy services for children in their home environments (YMCA of Central Ohio, 2024).

C – 2.7. The Ohio State University (OSU) Extension Pickaway County

The Ohio State University (OSU) Extension Pickaway County is located at 110 Island Road, Circleville, Ohio 43113. Examples of the OSU Extension Office include (but not limited to): (a) 4-H Youth Development, (b) Agriculture and Natural Resources, (c) Community Development and promotion of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) careers for youth, (d) Family and Consumer Sciences, (e) Master Gardener program, and (f) Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Education Program (SNAP-Ed), (g) Farm transition planning (The Ohio State University, 2024).

C – 3. Examples of Health Care Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Access to Transportation Services and Other Social Determinants of Health Needs

The health care facilities and community resources listed below address at least one social determinants of health such as access to transportation, food, housing, and jobs.

C – 3.1. OhioHealth Berger Hospital

The OhioHealth Berger Hospital collaborates with the Pickaway County Community Action Agency to offer free transportation services for community members to come to their medical appointments (Pickaway County Community Action Agency, n.d.).

C – 3.2. Ashville Food Pantry at First English Lutheran Church

The Ashville Food Pantry is located at 94 Long Street, Ashville, Ohio 43113. The Ashville Food Pantry is an official ministry of the First English Lutheran Church in partnership with other area churches. The Ashville Food Pantry provides food and produce, and assistance with utility bills, rent and prescription medications (VCNB Family, n.d.).

C – 3.3. Pickaway County Metropolitan Housing Authority

The Pickaway County Metropolitan Housing Authority is located at 176 Rustic Drive, Circleville, Ohio 43113. It handles the Housing Choice Voucher and coordinates the public housing programs. Housing complexes that are being managed by the Housing Authority include Williamsport Terrace, Eden Place, Pickaway Terrace and Louise Terrace (Pickaway Metropolitan Housing Authority, 2020). The Pickaway County Metropolitan Housing Authority manages public housing that provides quality rental housing for low-income families, elderly people and persons with disabilities (Pickaway Metropolitan Housing Authority, 2020). The Pickaway County Metropolitan Housing Authority also offers multi-family housing for the elderly and disabled. The Pickaway County Metropolitan Housing Authority also offers housing choice voucher and specialty purpose voucher (Pickaway Metropolitan Housing Authority, 2020).

C – 3.4. Food Banks serving Pickaway County

- **Mid-Ohio Food Collective** – assist persons in Pickaway County to obtain free food. The outreach team helps patients with free food sourcing information, eligibility requirements, and assistance with the application (FreshTrak, 2020).
- **Emergency Clearing House Pantry (Choice Pantry)** – located at 722 Clinton Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113 (FreshTrak, 2020).
- **Circleville Church of Christ Pantry** – located at 1555 N. Court Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113 (FreshTrak, 2020).
- **Walk the Talk Mobile Food Pantry Mobile Pantry** – serves Circleville, Ohio 43113 (FreshTrak, 2020)
- **Shield of Faith Ministries Pantry**– located at South Court Street, Circleville, Ohio 43113 (FreshTrak, 2020).

D. How Data was Obtained

D – 1. Community Served by the OhioHealth Berger Hospital

The definition of the community served by OhioHealth Berger Hospital was based on the percentage of patients who resided in Pickaway County during fiscal year 2022 and 2023, based on electronic medical records. See **Section A–2 (Table 1)**.

D – 2. Pickaway County Demographic Data

The demographic data of Pickaway County's population was obtained from the Ohio Department of Development (Ohio Department of Development, n.d). See **Section B**.

D – 3. Summary of Ohio's Health and Health-Related Data

Pertinent health data from Ohio's 2019 Community Health Assessment and 2022 Online State Health Assessment Portal were summarized (Ohio Department of Health, 2019). See **Appendix A**.

D – 4. Summary of Pickaway County's Health and Health-Related Data

Pertinent health data of Pickaway County's population compared to Ohio and the U.S. (County Health Rankings, 2020). See **Appendix B**.

D – 5. Information gaps

No information gaps that would limit the ability to assess the community's health needs were identified.

E. Significant Health Needs of the Community

As part of the public meetings for the Pickaway County's Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), the community stakeholders identified four priority health needs on August 10, 2023. OhioHealth Berger Hospital adopted Pickaway County's four priority health needs for its Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and Implementation Strategy.

The four priority health needs include are summarized in **Table 2**.

The community stakeholders also identified various significant health needs in Pickaway County. These include the following:

- Affordable housing crisis (lack of affordable, low-income housing options)
- Access to fresh, healthy food/reliance on fast food
- Access to activity (lack of transportation access, need for bike-friendly infrastructure)
- Food insecurity
- Higher paying jobs for college and educational attainment (lower percentage of advanced degrees in Pickaway compared to Ohio)
- Internet access (broadband 11% lower than Ohio)
- Households in poverty with children/access to benefits (percentage of households in poverty with children higher in Pickaway than Ohio)
- Mental health stigma (more women report, but everyone experiences poor mental health)
- Adverse Childhood Experiences (abuse – emotional, physical, sexual; relationship issues)
- Childcare (limited options during workday hours, not trained for special needs, lack of transportation to childcare)

OhioHealth Berger Hospital listed comprehensively various health care facilities and community resources that address the priority health needs and the remainder of the significant health needs in Pickaway County. **See Section C. “Existing Healthcare Facilities and Resources within the Community Available to Respond to the Community’s Health Needs”.**

F. Primary, Chronic Disease and Other Health Needs of Uninsured, Low-Income and Minority Populations

The primary and chronic disease needs and other health issues of uninsured, low-income and minority populations and the latest data for each need are summarized in **Appendixes A and B**.

G. Process for Identifying and Prioritizing Significant Health Needs of the Community

The Pickaway County Public Health consulted with Illuminology in conducting the Pickaway County Community Health Assessment (CHA) and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) (Pickaway County Public Health & Illuminology, 2023a,b). Illuminology is a private research and evaluation firm located at 5258 Bethel-Reed Park, Columbus, Ohio 43220. The Pickaway County Public Health and Illuminology jointly held the meetings, conducted surveys, and sought public inputs from 2022 to 2023. Representatives from OhioHealth Berger Hospital participated actively in these public meetings.

The community stakeholders identified 14 significant health needs in Pickaway County. During the first round of prioritization, each community stakeholder casted five votes to identify their top significant health needs. During the second round of prioritization, each community stakeholder casted three votes to identify their top 3 priority health needs. Illuminology asked the community stakeholders to consider various factors when identifying their top 3 priority health needs (Pickaway County Public Health & Illuminology, 2023). See **Table 3** for the list of factors that were utilized by community stakeholders during the Pickaway County prioritization of health needs.

Once the top three priority health needs were identified based on the highest votes, the community stakeholders unanimously voted add transportation as the fourth priority health need. Hence the top four priority health needs were (a) substance use, (b) health care access, (c) mental health care access, and (d) transportation.

H. Process for Consulting with Persons Representing the Community's Interests and Input Provided

Appendix C summarizes the details of organizations who participated in the Community Health Assessment (CHA) meetings.

Input from all required sources was obtained.

No written comments on OhioHealth's prior CHNA or Implementation Strategy were received.

I. Impact of Actions Taken to Address the Significant Health Needs Identified in the Hospital Facility's Most Recent Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)

OhioHealth Berger Hospital summarized in **Appendix D** the impacts of its actions for the priority health needs that were identified in its 2022 Community Health Needs Assessment. In 2022, the priority health needs in Pickaway County include (a) community conditions, (b) mental health and addiction, (c) chronic disease, and (d) maternal and infant health.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital also provided in **Appendix D** the population data to specific Actions that aligned with Ohio's State Health Improvement Plan.

J. Organizations Contracted to Assist with Conducting the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)

There were no contractors involved in the conduct of OhioHealth Berger Hospital's Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). OhioHealth Berger Hospital actively participated in the public meetings that was hosted by Pickaway County Public Health during the conduct of Pickaway County's 2023 Community Health Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHA and CHIP). Pickaway County Public Health contracted with Illuminology, a research and evaluation private company based in Columbus, Ohio in conducting the primary data, secondary data, co-hosting the public meetings and writing the CHA and CHIP reports.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital adopted the priority health needs that were identified from Pickaway County's CHA and CHIP. The Pickaway County community stakeholders identified four priority needs, namely (a) substance use, (b) health care access, (c) mental health care access and (d) transportation.

Dr. Mary Ann G. Abiado, PhD, MSN, RN, OhioHealth's Data Management and Evaluation Specialist and Community Health Nurse has over 14 years of experience in writing OhioHealth's Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and developing Implementation Strategies to address the priority health needs. The 2025 Berger Hospital CHNA and Fiscal Year 2026-2028 Implementation Strategy was reviewed by OhioHealth leaders, including Gretchen Roberts, Chief Nursing Officer and Jeffrey R. Kasler, Director of OhioHealth Government Relations.

The OhioHealth Legal Department has reviewed the content of the OhioHealth Berger Hospital CHNA and assessed that the contents are compliant with the Internal Revenue Service's requirements for nonprofit hospitals.

Summary of Findings from Appendix Table 16

Cancer Cases and Deaths in Ohio (2016-2020) – Cancer is the second leading cause of death in Ohio. Cancer accounts for 1 in 5 deaths in Ohio. Four out of 10 people in Ohio will be diagnosed with cancer during their lifetime.

New Invasive Cancer Cases in Pickaway County (2016-2020) – On average, 350 new invasive cancer cases per year were diagnosed among Pickaway County residents. The top 5 new invasive cancer cases in Pickaway County were lung and bronchus cancer, female breast cancer, prostate cancer, colon and rectum cancer, and melanoma of the skin. These top five cancers represented 53% of all new invasive cancer cases. The cancer incidence rate (new cases) for all sites/types of cancer in Pickaway County was higher compared to Ohio and United States rate. Males in Pickaway County, Ohio and U.S. had slightly higher cancer incidence rates (based on new cancer cases) compared to females.

Cancer Deaths in Pickaway County (2016-2020) – On average, 136 cancer deaths per year were diagnosed among Pickaway County residents. The top 5 leading causes of cancer death in Pickaway County were lung and bronchus cancer, pancreatic cancer, female breast cancer, and liver and intrahepatic bile duct cancer. These top 5 causes of cancer deaths represented 57% of all cancer deaths. The cancer death rate for all sites/types of cancer in Pickaway County was higher compared to Ohio rate and United States rate. Males in Pickaway County, Ohio and United States had higher cancer death rates compared to females. Death rates of Blacks in Pickaway County were significantly higher compared to Whites. there were no marked differences in death rates between Whites and Blacks in Ohio and United States.

The OhioHealth Berger Hospital's case management team is aware of the Pickaway Guidance Mental Health Series recordings that are available at the Pickaway County Educational Service Center's website (Pickaway County Educational Service Center, 2024). These recordings address school children's emotional wellbeing. Examples of these publicly available recordings and live virtual events are presented in **Appendix Table 20**.

The OhioHealth Berger Hospital recognizes the Pickaway County Grief Groups that are free of charge in Westfall Local Schools in collaboration with the Pickaway Family and Children First Council, Integrated Services for Behavioral Health, and Scioto Paint Valley Mental Health Centers. Grief counseling helps persons who feel grief to manifest emotions without being overwhelmed. Participation in individual and group therapy with other people who have lost loved ones (Westfall Local School District, 2024).

The OhioHealth Berger Hospital recognizes the home-based supportive services that are provided by the Integrated Services for Behavioral Health Pickaway County. The Community Behavioral Health Workers meet with clients in their home or other convenient places to support behavioral health and general well-being (Pathways of Central Ohio, 2024).

OhioHealth family practice doctor, Dr. Veronica Poffel, MD provided speakerships on youth vaping to junior and senior students from Logan Elm High School on the following dates: (a) November 30, 2022, (b) December 7, 2022, (c) December 14, 2022. Dr. Poffel's talk engaged at least 50 high school students to openly discuss the importance of social interactions and relationships with peers and family members. Active discussions among youth, peers and family members affect decisions pertinent to health promotion, lifestyle choices, and management of stress.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital's Alignment with the State Health Improvement Plan related to Promotion of Social and Emotional Wellbeing in Schools (CC – 2)

According to Lynn Huston, the following are available community gardens in Pickaway County:

- **Circleville City Parks** – Mary Virginia Crites Hannan Park pollinator gardens. The plants in pollinator gardens attract bees, butterflies, and insects, which are conducive to growing fruits and vegetables.
- **Monroe Township Park** – pollinator/phenology garden tended by Pickaway County Master Gardener Volunteers. The Master Gardener Volunteers of Pickaway County maintain the two gardens at the Monroe Township Park to educate the public on when to plant and care for crops and how to attract pollinators to home gardens.

CC – 4. Partnerships and Referrals with Pickaway County Job and Family Services

The Pickaway County Job and Family Services offers various services that address (a) lack of healthcare coverage; (c) lack of events that foster healthy social building among youth and young adults; (d) high poverty rates; and (e) domestic violence, child abuse and neglect, and adverse childhood experiences (Pickaway County Job and Family Services, 2020).

- CC – 4.1. Children Services and Adult Protective Services** — aims to promote strength and preservation of families and prevent child abuse and neglect. Services are provided at the family's home or in a relative's home or foster care. Families follow a court-ordered plan to address risk factors and enhance family wellness and integrity. The Adult Protective Services enhance services for the elderly such as cleaning services and assessments of competency.
- CC – 4.2. Child Support** — ensures that all children are supported financially by both parents. The money collected helps provide for basic expenses such as food and shelter. Services include (a) establishing paternity, (b) coordinating and enforcing child support and medical support orders, (c) locating non-custodial parents, (d) review and assessment of orders and (e) track child support collections.
- CC – 4.3. Adult and Family Services/Child Care** — provides monetary and support to families and adults through (a) Ohio Works First, (b) Prevention, Retention and Contingency (PRC) program, (c) assistance for food, and (d) access to health coverage through Medicaid.
- CC – 4.4. OhioMeansJobs-Pickaway** — helps employers who are finding qualified applicants for jobs and training.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital's Impacts in Fiscal Year 2023-2025 related to Partnerships and Referrals with Pickaway County Job and Family Services (CC – 4)

The OhioHealth Berger Hospital's social workers, case managers, and other members of the healthcare team are knowledgeable of the services of the Pickaway County Job and Family Services. Patients needing healthcare insurance, jobs, and other assistance are being referred to the Pickaway Job and Family Services. The OhioHealth Berger Hospital's Care Management and Social Services teams regularly communicates with the Pickaway County Job and Family Services to ensure that patients obtain the support they needed.

The mission statement of the Pickaway County Job and Family Services is "Through leadership and partnering with our community, we assist and encourage the people of Pickaway County to become safe, stable, healthy, and self-sufficient individuals and families, with opportunities for growth. OhioHealth Berger Hospital will partner with the Pickaway County Public Health and other community stakeholders in promoting Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) free classes

MHA – 4.2. Advertise the training to local churches, schools, colleges, universities, career academies, rotary clubs, law enforcement, and other government agencies.

This action (MHA – 4) aligns with the 2020-2022 State Health Improvement Plan.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital's Impacts in Fiscal Year 2023-2025 related to Mental Health First Aid (MHA – 4)

In Fiscal Year 2023, OhioHealth Berger Hospital was not able to partner with Pickaway County Public Health and other community stakeholders in offering Mental Health First Aid Classes in Pickaway County. However, as part of its care management and care coordination services at Berger Hospital's Postpartum Unit, 100% of mothers who delivered at Berger Hospital were provided with information materials about Mental Health America of Ohio's Perinatal Outreach and Encouragement for Moms (POEM) program and services.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital, Emergency Department, primary clinics, and ambulatory care centers in Pickaway County provided evidenced-based care and referral as needed to patients with mental health, behavioral and neurodevelopmental disorders (ICD-CM-F01-F99). See **Appendix Tables 31 and 32** for count of patients served by the OhioHealth Berger Hospital, Emergency Department, primary clinics, and ambulatory care centers with F01-F99 diagnoses.

According to Santo et al. (2023), analysis of Emergency Department visits in the United States from 2018 to 2021 resulted in 1.03 million visits made by children (less than age 12) and adolescents (age 12-17) who had a mental health disorder diagnosis. Mood disorders, anxiety disorders, and behavioral and emotional disorders were the most frequent mental health diagnoses among Emergency Department visits of children and adolescents. Total of 60.2% of the mental health Emergency Department visits of children and adolescents were reimbursed to Medicaid. Total of 25% of the children and adolescents visiting the Emergency Department were prescribed at last one psychiatric medication for the mental health condition.

According to Peters et al. (2023), from 2018 to 2020, a yearly average of 774,508 Emergency Department visits in the United States were mental health related. This accounts for 12.3% of all Emergency department visits made by adults per year. Additionally, mental health disorders accounted for 53 Emergency Department visits per 1,000 adults per year. Substance use disorders accounted for 27.6 Emergency Department visits per 1,000 adults per year. Non-Hispanic Black adults had highest rates of mental health-related Emergency Department visits (96.8 visits per 1,000 adults), followed by non-Hispanic White (53.4 Emergency Department visits per 1,000 adults) and Hispanic (36 Emergency Department visits per 1,000 adults). Non-Hispanic Black adults also showed the highest rates of visits for various mental health-related disorders, substance use disorders, anxiety disorders, and mood disorders.

CD – 3. Weight Management Clinic and Education Services

The OhioHealth McConnell Heart Health Center integrates a holistic approach to weight loss that enables patients to feel better and gain more energy to live healthy. The OhioHealth Weight management program provides tools to eat right, adopt a healthy lifestyle, counseling about the emotional aspects of eating habits, and healthy and safe exercise, and maintaining a healthy weight (OhioHealth 2015-2021).

CD – 3.1. Medical (Non-Surgical Program) — enrollment involves two appointments: (a) meeting with exercise physiologists to complete a body composition analysis and fasting blood values, and (b) creation of customized meal plans, and weight loss program. Patients may select from three paths of care, namely, (a) Medical Weight 12-Week Class Series, (b) Medical Weight Individual Care, and (c) Medical Weight Clinic Patient.

CD – 3.2. Surgical weight management (bariatric surgery) — helps people who are significantly overweight lose pounds effectively and safely. It works by restricting the amount of food you can eat, and it often results in dramatic weight loss for people who haven't been able to lose weight by other means. OhioHealth's surgical weight management program is designed to provide the right procedure for each person, along with continued support to maintain weight loss.

CD – 4. Community Partnerships to Promote Health Behaviors

OhioHealth will partner with Pickaway County Public Health and other community stakeholders in strengthening partnerships that promote health behaviors to reduce the prevalence of heart disease, diabetes and obesity in Pickaway County. Activities may include (but not limited to): (a) determining the baseline count of healthcare providers that screen for hypertension and follow-up with patients diagnosed with high blood pressure; (b) increasing education for healthcare providers regarding the need to increase efforts to screen for high blood pressure, provide treatment, and follow-up; (c) partner with community organizations to screen for high blood pressure and raise awareness of high blood pressure; (d) offer free/reduced cost health screening events through health fairs or hospital screening events; (e) distribute educational materials that address high blood pressure, obesity and diabetes; (f) develop a public health campaign in encouraging residents about “know your numbers” for blood pressure, cholesterol; (g) public awareness on the signs and symptoms of heart attack or stroke.

This action (CD – 4) aligns with the 2022-2022 State Health Improvement Plan.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital’s Impacts in Fiscal Year 2023-2025 related to Community Partnerships to Promote Health Behaviors (CD – 4)

OhioHealth Berger Hospital collaborated with the Pickaway Public Library, Pickaway County Young Men Christian Association (YMCA) and the Pickaway Ross Career Technology Center in promoting healthy behaviors. See **Appendix Table 48**.

OhioHealth Berger Hospital’s inpatient, Emergency Department and outpatient facilities have served patients with heart disease, diabetes, and obesity. Approximately 65 persons come to the Community Kitchen each month.

MIH – 2. OhioHealth Screenings and Exams for Women

OhioHealth will conduct check-ups and age-appropriate screenings for women to help maintain health, wellness and prevent cancer and other diseases. The women's risk factors such as family history, alcohol or tobacco use, obesity and sexual activity are considered during these exams (OhioHealth, 2015-2021).

- MIH – 2.1. Physical exam** — thorough check of overall health status and wellbeing
- MIH – 2.2. Blood pressure** — one of the vital signs that is being measured at each clinic visit to determine the pressure of blood flow in the body
- MIH – 2.3. Blood and urine tests** — screen for cholesterol, diabetes, kidney, and thyroid problems

- MIH – 2.7. Breast Health and Cancer Screening** — clinical breast exam that is performed by a physician
- MIH – 2.8. Screening mammogram** — X-ray of the breast
- MIH – 2.9. Reproductive health and cervical cancer screening** — gynecological pelvic exam and PAP smear
- MIH – 2.10. Colon and rectal health and cancer screening** — includes screening colonoscopy (recommended) and annual stool tests (alternative)
- MIH – 2.11. Lung health and cancer screening** — low-dose chest computed tomography (CT)
