#### Introduction

OhioHealth is a nationally recognized, not-for-profit, system of faith-based hospitals and healthcare organizations serving 50 Ohio counties. All OhioHealth entities are connected by (a) a mission to "improve the health of those we serve"; (b) core values of compassion, excellence, stewardship, integrity, and inclusion; (c) cardinal value of "we honor the dignity and worth of each person". OhioHealth's vision is "to provide exceptional care for all through experiences that earn a lifetime of trust". **Table 1** shows the 16 OhioHealth member hospitals that are in 12 Ohio counties and serves patients residing in 50 of the 88 counties in Ohio.

OhioHealth has been known nationally for its world-class healthcare services. OhioHealth has been recognized by Fortune as one of the "100 Best Companies to Work For" from 2007 – 2021". (OhioHealth 2024). Great Place to Work® and PEOPLE magazine have honored OhioHealth as one of the 2021 PEOPLE Companies that Care® (OhioHealth 2024). In 2020, four OhioHealth hospitals, namely, Riverside Methodist Hospital, Grant Medical Center, Doctors Hospital and Dublin Methodist Hospital were named a 2020 LGBTQ Healthcare Equality Top Performer based on the 2020 Healthcare Equality Index (HEI) administered by the Human Rights Campaign (HRC). In 2020, OhioHealth was recognized as Great Place to Work − Certified™ based on the Great Place to Work® Trust Index™ survey.

In February 2021, the OhioHealth Inclusion Pledge was adopted throughout the health system. Each OhioHealth employee becomes a part of a culture that cares; one that supports one another; and honors the dignity and worth of each person. OhioHealth is committed to ensuring that the organization reflects the rich diversity of the communities we serve. We respect, embrace, and derive strength from the ways that we are similar and the ways that we are different.

OhioHealth is dedicated to serving communities through its community benefit. In Fiscal Year 2023, OhioHealth provided a total \$468 million in Community Benefit, including \$107.7 million in charity care, \$254.7 million in net cost of Medicaid programs, \$67.2 million in net cost of medical education, \$0.9 million in subsidized health services, \$10.8 million toward community health services, \$25.7 million in cash and in-kind contributions, and \$1 million for research.

OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center is a 110-bed hospital that builds on the tradition of quality, people- and community-centered care, programs, services, education, and outreach in southeastern Ohio. Examples of quality services include but not limited to:

- Comprehensive cancer care include preventive services, treatment, chemotherapy, immunotherapy, infusion services, radiation treatment, genetic counseling. In Guernsey County, the OhioHealth cancer programs and services are offered at the John W. and Edna McManus Shepard Cancer Center, 1455 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725.
- Emergency and trauma services The Southeastern Medical Center at 1341 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725 offers top notch emergency and trauma care.
- Heart and vascular services In Guernsey County, the OhioHealth Heart and Vascular care offers access
  to the (a) OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Physicians; (b) OhioHealth Cardiac
  Rehabilitation; and (c) Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Laboratory. Examples of programs and services
  include but not limited to (a) cardiovascular disease management; (b) cardiac testing; (c) echocardiograms;
  (d) Holter monitoring; (e) cardiac rehabilitation; and (f) pulmonary rehabilitation.
- Imaging and radiology –In Guernsey County, the OhioHealth Imaging and Radiology offers (a) diagnostic imaging; (b) mammography; (c) nuclear medicine; (d) x-ray; (e) magnetic resonance imaging (MRI); (f) ultrasound; and (g) computed tomography (CT) scan.
- Laboratory services patients can access the OhioHealth Laboratory Services with a provider's order but without a need for an appointment.

- Maternity services The OhioHealth obstetrics and gynecology providers at the Childbirth Center and
  outpatient clinics provide personalized and supportive care to women and their babies during the perinatal
  and postpartum period. The OhioHealth Childbirth Center is a Level 1 Perinatal Center, which provide
  referrals and transports for women with high-risk pregnancies and babies with serious conditions who need
  higher level of care.
- Neuroscience services Southeastern Medical Center's neuroscience multidisciplinary team diagnoses
  neurological conditions involving the brain and spine using tools such as but not limited to: (a) computerized
  axial tomography; (b) electroencephalography (EEG); (c) electromyography (EMG); and (d) magnetic
  resonance imaging (MRI).
- Orthopedics services Southeastern Medical Center's orthopedics (bone and joint) services are available at (a) OhioHealth WorkHealth Cambridge, which is located at 10095 Brick Church Road, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; and (b) OhioHealth Physician Group Orthopedics, which is located at 1230 Clark Street, Suite A, Cambridge, Ohio 43725.
- Pain Management services provides patients with access to physical therapy, massage, cognitive and behavioral therapies. OhioHealth primary care physicians and providers refer patients to pain management care to improve the health and wellbeing of patients with chronic pain.
- Podiatry provides patients with comprehensive foot and ankle care to treat or manage injuries or
  conditions, such as but not limited to bunions, wounds, flat feet, and warts. OhioHealth's podiatrists and their
  multidisciplinary team specializes in reconstructive and corrective surgery to ensure balance and
  functioning.
- Primary Care OhioHealth Physician Group (OPG) Primary Care are available at (a) OPG Primary Care Cambridge, which is located at 1210 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; and (b) OPG Primary Care Caldwell, which is located at 18125 Woodsfield Road, Caldwell, Ohio 43724. Examples of primary care services include but are not limited to (a) care for routine illnesses and injuries and management of chronic health conditions; (b) alternative and integrative medicine; (c) comprehensive physical exams for all age groups; (d) yearly health screenings; (e) pre-operative evaluation and medical clearance for surgery; (f) infant care, pediatrics and adolescent medicine; (g) nutrition counseling; (h) weight management; and (i) care and treatment for urgent care needs such as sore throat, and sinus infections.
- **Rehabilitation and Therapy** OhioHealth's Rehabilitation and Therapy Clinic provides orthopedic care for (a) broken bones; (b) joint injuries and dislocations; (c) muscle injuries; (d) sports injuries; (e) sprains and strains; (f) lacerations; and (g) worker's compensation first report of injury.
- Sleep Disorders Clinic OhioHealth's multidisciplinary team diagnose and treat sleeping disorders such as (a) sleep apnea; (b) snoring; (c) narcolepsy; (d) restless legs syndrome; and (e) insomnia.
- Sports Medicine OhioHealth provides care for athletes and active persons from all age groups. OhioHealth's Sports Medicine providers perform specialized treatments such as but not limited to (a) arthritis care; (b) castings; (c) concussion management; (d) conditions or injuries of the hand, wrist and forearm; (e) sports performance; and (f) tendon injuries.
- **Urology** OhioHealth offers care for men and women to evaluate kidney and bladder functioning and conditions, including (a) kidney stones; (b) men's sexual and prostate health; (c) urinary incontinence; (d) urinary tract infections; and (e) magnetic resonance imaging fusion biopsy.
- Wound care OhioHealth provides comprehensive services for (a) people with hard-to-heal wounds; (b) wounds of people with diabetes; and (c) various types of wounds. The team provides (a) wound assessment; (b) compression therapy; (c) debridement; (d) dressing changes; (e) infection prevention and management; (f) vascular surgical support; and (g) wound vacuum assisted closure (VAC) application.

OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center received various awards and recognitions related to excellent quality of patient care and use of technology to further improve patient care services.

- a. Accreditation by The Joint Commission The OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center received accreditation from The Joint Commission as a "hospital" (The Joint Commission, 2024). The Southeastern Medical Center is located at 1341 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. The OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's additional sites has also been accredited, including outpatient clinics at (a) 1205 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; (b) 10095 Brick Church Road, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; (c) Cancer Center that is located at 1455 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; (d) Caldwell Physical Therapy and Rehabilitation that is located at 18125 Woodsfield Road, Suite A, Caldwell, Ohio 43724; (e) OhioHealth Pain Management that is located at 1210 Neal Drive, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; (f) Muskingum Valley Health Center Imaging Services that is located at 1330 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725; and (g) Pediatric Rehabilitation Center that is located at 1410 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725.
- b. Certification by the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center is certified as a Community Cancer Program (American College of Surgeons, 1996-2024).
- c. American College of Radiology™ Accreditation OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's radiology accreditation include breast ultrasound; stereo radiography; positron emission tomography (PET); and mammography (American College of Radiology™, n.d.).

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 requires not-for-profit hospitals to conduct a community health needs assessment once every three years (Internal Revenue Service, 2024). OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center hosted the public health meeting on August 14, 2024, to identify and prioritize the significant health needs in Guernsey County and determine the Hospital's alignment with Ohio's 2020-2022 State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP). OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center developed the Fiscal Year 2026–2028 Implementation Strategy in collaboration with the Cambridge Guernsey County Health Department and various community stakeholders. OhioHealth's strong and sustainable partnerships demonstrate continuing commitment to play active and effective roles in the Guernsey County community by fulfilling OhioHealth's mission of "to improve the health of those we serve." Moreover, OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's Implementation Strategy will include actions and strategies that align with the Ohio 2020–2022 State Health Improvement Plan (Ohio Department of Health, n.d.).

# A. Definition of the Community Served by the Hospital Facility

#### A - 1. Location of hospitals and ZIP codes of communities served.

OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center I is located at 1341 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. The "community served" by the OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center is Guernsey County, Ohio based on the percent of patients served from Guernsey County. See **Section A** – **2**. The communities reside in zip codes 43722, 43723, 43725, 43732, 43733, 43736, 43749, 43750, 43755, 43768, 43772, 43773, 43778, and 43780 (Datasheer, LLC, 2003-2024).

## A – 2. Percent of patients served by OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center from Guernsey County, Ohio.

**Table 2** shows the percent of inpatients, outpatients, Emergency Department, observation, surgeries, and births from Guernsey County residents during Fiscal Year 2022 (7/1/2021 to 6/30/2022) and Fiscal Year 2023 (7/1/2022 to 6/30/2023). On average, patients from Guernsey County comprised 68.96%% and 69.01%, respectively, of patients served by OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center in Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023. These data demonstrated that Guernsey County is the "community served" by the OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center.

- C 1. Healthcare Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Significant Health Needs Related to Mental Health and Addiction, Access to Care, and Social Determinants of Health.
  - C = 1.1. OhioHealth's Behavioral Health Services OhioHealth offers inpatient, outpatient, and behavioral health resources (OhioHealth, 2015-2024). Services include (a) inpatient care, (b) electroconvulsive therapy (ECT), (c) psychiatric emergency services, and (d) inpatient consultation/liaison services (OhioHealth, 2015-2024).

The OhioHealth Inpatient Behavioral Health Services are available at three locations, namely:

- OhioHealth Mansfield Hospital Behavioral Health located at 335 Glessner Avenue, Mansfield, Ohio 44903. Services include intensive outpatient program and Employee Assistance Program (OhioHealth, 2015-2024).
- OhioHealth Marion General Hospital Behavioral Health located at 1000 McKinley Park Drive, Marion, Ohio 43302.
- OhioHealth Riverside Methodist Hospital Behavioral Health located at 3535
   Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214.

The **OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Services** offers (a) Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP); (b) Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP); (c) Behavioral Health Outpatient Consultation/Transition Services; (d) Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction Program (MBSR); and (e) Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation (TMS) (OhioHealth 2015-2024).

- OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Offices Central Ohio located at 3820
   Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214.
- OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health located at 5141 West Broad Street, Suite 115, Columbus, Ohio 43228.
- OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health Columbus Dublin Granville Road located at 5150 E. Dublin Granville Road, Suite 250, Columbus, Ohio 43081.
- OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health Columbus West Lane Avenue Suite

- C = 1.2. OhioHealth Physician Group (OPG) Primary Care Clinics provides care for children, adolescents, adults, and older adults who presents with common mental health problems such as depression, anxiety, and other mood disorders.
  - OPG Primary Care at Cambridge located at 1210 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725
  - OPG Primary Care at Caldwell located at 18125 Woodsfield Road, Caldwell, Ohio 43724
- **C 1.3. Muskingum Valley Health Center –** has a Behavioral Health service line that provides care through in-person or telehealth.
  - The Behavioral Health Team comprised of psychiatrists, licensed independent social
    workers, licensed social workers, psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners, and
    licensed professional clinical counselors. The Team takes care of patients with mental
    health challenges.
  - The Substance Abuse Team comprised of advanced practice nurses, social workers, drug and alcohol counselors and psychiatrist. The Team serves individual patients and pregnant women who has opiate disorders, drugs and alcohol and substance abuse challenges.
    - Outpatient counseling include drug and alcohol assessments; access to psychiatry, individualized counseling.
    - + **Outpatient withdrawal symptom management** prescribes medications to manage anxiety, restless legs syndrome, and gastro-intestinal disorders.
    - + **Linkage and referral to higher levels of care** transition of care to residential treatment programs and acute medical management programs.
  - Social Determinants of Health Team comprised of social workers and case workers
    that provide one-on-one coaching to address social determinants, linkage and referral to
    community resources that aid persons related to transportation, housing, food, finances,
    application assistance to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary
    Assistance to Needy Families (TANF); and referrals to legal services and other social
    determinants-related support services.

C – 1.4. Muskingum Area ADAMH Board – The Mental Health and recovery Services Board serving Coshocton, Guernsey, Morgan, Muskingum, Noble, and Perry Counties' (also known as Muskingum Area ADAMH Board) vision is "Our communities will be mentally healthy and addiction free." The Board's mission is "to distribute federal, state and local funding to community providers in response to community need and in a way that facilitates the existence of and access to high quality mental health and substance use recovery services in the six counties."

The ADAMH Board has contract agencies based in Guernsey County. Examples of contract agencies include:

- Forensic Diagnostic Center of District 9 located at 1109 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. Examples of functions of Forensic Diagnostic Center of District Nine, Inc. (Ohio Forensic Centers Consortium, 2023) include but not limited to:
  - + Provides court-ordered forensic evaluations for courts within east-central and southeastern Ohio.
  - + Conducts Competency to Stand Trial Evaluations.
  - + Sanity evaluations.
  - + "Not Guilty by Reason of Insanity (NGRI) Evaluations.
  - + Juvenile Competency Evaluations.
  - + Transfer of Jurisdiction from Juvenile to Adult Court.
  - + Mental condition Evaluations.
  - + Second Opinion Evaluations- Level V.
  - + Conditional Release of Ohio Department of Mental Health forensic patients.
  - Forensic Monitoring Services.
  - Serves as a liaison between community treatment providers and the Court system.
  - + Outpatient Competency Restoration Program for 20 rural Ohio counties.
  - + Consultation to mental health programs serving criminal justice clients.
  - + Consults to criminal justice programs serving persons with mental health problems.
  - + Educational sessions regarding forensic issues.

- Hickory Behavioral Network of Ohio located at 66755 State Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. The Hickory Behavioral Network of Ohio is an 80-bed acute inpatient psychiatric center and offers 24/7 admission and stabilization for patients (Hickory Recovery Network, 2024). The facility caters to the psychiatric needs of adult and older adults. The Hickory Behavioral Network of Ohio provides individualized treatment.
  - People having thoughts or threats to harm others and self.
  - People having suicidal ideations.
  - Severe depression and anxiety.
  - Bipolar disorder.
  - + Psychosis.
  - Medication adjustment.
  - Acute or severe behavior changes.
  - Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder.
  - Delusions.
  - Paranoia.
  - Cognitive impairment and mental health crisis among older adults.
  - Uncontrolled use of alcohol, prescription drugs, and other illegal substances.
- Allwell Behavioral Health Services The Guernsey Counseling Center is located at 2500 John Glenn Highway, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. The Noble Counseling Center Marietta Road office is located at 44020 Marietta Road, Caldwell, Ohio 43724. See Allwell Behavioral Health Services (2024) for details of programs and services.
  - Crisis Services available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week (24/7), 365 days a year. The crisis services at Allwell's offices, area emergency departments, schools, and legal facilities.

The **Crisis Stabilization Unit** is an 8-bed Crisis Stabilization Unit is a short-term alternative to hospitalization. The Crisis Stabilization Unit serves 18 years and above who have psychiatric illnesses or emotional challenges. Allwell services include psychiatric and nursing consultations, case management, and individualized therapy.

The **Crisis and Suicide Hotline** enables assistance 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year to adults, children, and adolescents. The 24-hour Crisis Hotline helps people undergoing emotional crisis. The Allwell team will determine if a client needs professional consults, and linkage and referral to community services.

The Crisis Services serve Coshocton, Guernsey, Morgan, Muskingum, Noble and Perry Counties.

- Mobile Family Crisis Services (MRSS) crisis stabilization services to youth under age 21 and their families who are facing challenges or distress that hinders their ability to function at their home, school or in the community. The MRSS aims to reduce persons going to jail, getting hospitalized, and out-of-home placements. The team provides crisis intervention, de-escalation, and safety assessment. Youth and their families provide family support, family education, and community linkage for 4 to 6 weeks.
- + Counseling and Therapy provides individual, marital, group or substance abuse therapy to assist with thinking clearly, feeling better, decision making, and relating more effectively with others. Allwell's clinicians assess, diagnose, treat and make referrals to supportive services to accommodate collaborative care.

Allwell also provide Employee Assistance Programs for employees so they could perform better at work by resolving problems related to substance abuse or emotions. Allwell uses treatment models such as but not limited to grief counseling; anger management; child counseling; Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), Dialectical Behavioral Therapy (DBT); marriage counseling; family counseling; Treatment models are customized to the needs of the patients.

- Primary care services primary care providers are integrated with mental and behavioral health services to more effectively tackle holistic care of physical and mental health needs.
- Psychiatric medication management The team of psychiatrists, nurse practitioners, and social workers evaluate patient's progress toward the therapeutic treatment, prescribe medications when necessary, and closely monitor treatment effectiveness and efficacy. Allwell's medication management team will collaborate with the patient's therapist and case manager to ensure effective treatment regimens and enable the patient to reach their wellness goals.
- + Case management The Allwell case managers ensure that the patient is able to thrive in the community and access the necessary support and community resources. The case manager coaches the patient in building and mastering coping skills, relationship building, and other daily activities.
- Psychiatric diagnostic evaluation focuses on mental and behavioral health issues to prioritize specific issues the patient is facing and how these challenges affect the person's daily activities. The clinicians will assess condition of relationships, work, stress, family background, traumatic experiences. Once the diagnostic evaluation is complete, the clinical team will talk about treatment options and other necessary linkage or referrals to ensure effective treatment process.
- + School-based services Allwell serves local schools to provide prevention and direct clinical services. Licensed providers are assigned to each school to serve the needs of students, teachers, and families. Additionally, they provide community education, agency consultation, and emergency services.
- Community linkages patients are linked or referred to community agencies related to healthcare, social services, legal assistance, financial assistance, and access to services of the Guernsey County Department of Job and Family Services.
- + Consults, education, and prevention programming Allwell fights the stigma of behavioral health problems; raise awareness of mental health issues through community education, consults and prevention strategies. These outreach services are implemented in health fairs, community events, consults with teachers, first responders, and social service agencies.

- Drop-In centers to promote social skills consumers who feel alone or stressed may come to drop-in to centers, meet new friends and become sociable in a safe, non-judgmental environment. There is a small monthly fee to participate in activities Monday to Thursday. People may join weekly support groups, which are led by Certified Peer Support staff.
- FIRST Episode is a coordinated specialty care program for persons with first psychotic illness. For example, people with schizophrenia or schizoaffective disorder who have lost with reality have better chances of recovery through early treatment.

Allwell offers personalized treatment program, including (a) coordination of Individual Resiliency Training; (b) psychiatric care; (c) Supported Employment and Education; (d) Family Education and Support; and Case Management Services.

- + **Group Therapy** includes Day Treatment and Partial Hospitalization. The session is held for three hours. The group therapies are led by trained therapists who motivates participants to face challenges, engage in their treatment, and make necessary lifestyle changes.
- Guardianship The program supports the emotional, social, and physical wellbeing of adults. Guardians advocate for the rights of individuals with disability that causes incompetency. Examples of mental incapacity include people suffering from severe mental illness; acquired brain injury; intellectual disability; conditions associated with old age; conditions related to stroke, chronic intoxication, and dementia.
- + Housing and supported housing Allwell provides community housing services assist with paying rent for mentally disabled adults who lives in private rental housing or community group and boarding homes. People who turned 18 who lives in transitional housing are eligible for supportive housing.
- Peer recovery support services Allwell values the importance of peer support since participants are able to share experiences related to managing life situation.
- Guernsey County Department of Job and Family Services administers public assistance; Child Support Enforcement Agency, OhioMeansJobs; and social services to Guernsey County residents.
  - Public assistance helps needy Guernsey County residents obtain access to food and health care coverage. The Public Assistance provides a safety net for families in immediate crisis. The Public Assistance Division establishes eligibility for programs that aims to establish self-sufficiency. People receiving public assistance benefits must work or get involved in allowable activities up to 40 hours per week. Activities for people who avails of public assistance may include (a) job search/job readiness classes; (b) unpaid work experience; (c) job skills training; (d) vocational training; (e) GED classes; and (f) college.
    - Access to Food Assistance program also called Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). SNAP helps poor individuals and families have access to food. The United States Department of Agriculture coordinates SNAP benefits that enables purchase food and grocery items. Eligibility to SNAP is based on federal guidelines, income, allowable expenses such as rent/mortgage, utility bills, childcare, and child support, household size, and resources.

- Access to Medicaid health care coverage
   – serves low-income families and children and Aged Blind or have a Disability (ABD) (Ohio Department of Medicaid, n.d.).
- + Child Support Enforcement Agency (CSEA) ensures that children receive the appropriate financial support they deserve. The CSEA partners with County, State, and Federal agencies, parents, legislators, judges, healthcare team, advocacy groups, and employers.
- + **OhioMeansJobs Guernsey County** serves businesses, job seekers, and workforce. The functions of OhioMeansJobs Guernsey County include:
  - Skills improvement among the workforce.
  - o Help businesses with the needs of the workforce.
  - o Help people seeking jobs achieve their job goals.
  - o Improve self-sufficiency among people receiving public assistance.
  - o Provide access to learning and job information.
  - o Collaborate with community partners to ensure quality services.
  - Offer the Career Advancement Program through the Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program (CCMEP) to ensure continuing education and training.

#### + Social services -

- Adult Protective Services (APS) safeguard for older adults in Guernsey County. The mission of APS is to protect persons aged 60 and older from abuse, neglect, exploitation. APS services may include (a) casework services; (b) referral for medical services; (c) access to mental health services; (d) access to legal services; (e) money management; (f) access to home health care; (g) homemaker services; (h) housing-related services; (i) access to guardianship services; and (j) referral for food, clothing, and shelter.
- o Fraud Investigation Unit enables reporting of fraud, waste, and abuse within the Guernsey County Department of Job and Family Services. Example of fraud may include: (a) hiding of one's employment while receiving benefits; (b) failure t(c) did not report income from child support, Social Security, unemployment compensation; (d) receive benefit for a child not under one's care; (e) conceals marriage or assets of spouse; (f) fails to report a parent or legal guardian of a child residing in the home; (g) food stamp trafficking; (h) lives outside Guernsey County but receives benefits from the Guernsey County Job and Family Services; and (i) fails to notify Guernsey County Job and Family Services of the death of a case member and continues to receive and utilize the benefits of the deceased.

Financial Assistance – The Ohio Works First (OWF) is a federally funded program and part of Ohio's Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF). The Ohio Works First (OWF) gives monthly, time-limited cash assistance to financially eligible families. OWF focuses on job opportunities, obtaining training and experience as a way of attaining self-sufficiency. Cash assistance is provided up to 36 months for low-income families. Cash assistance is available for children less than age 19 and pregnant women in their third trimester.

The Ohio's Disability Financial Assistance program is a safety net for needy individuals who are eligible for the Disability Financial Assistance (DFA) which is coordinated by the Disability Determination Unit.

- C 1.5. Guernsey County Board of Developmental Disabilities As part of its many programs and services to support people with disabilities in Guernsey County, Ohio, Guernsey County Board of Developmental Disabilities provides access to mental and behavioral health services as part of its comprehensive services. Examples of programs and services that may directly or indirectly address mental and behavioral health of people with disabilities in Guernsey County include:
  - Early childhood services for people with disabilities birth to age 6 offers family centered programs for children from birth to age 3. Heath and developmental services are provided so children are able to start school ready.
    - + Service coordination and evaluations for children.
    - + Early identification of children with developmental delays.
    - + Information, guidance and links to treatment and therapies.
  - School Age Services for people with disabilities age 6 to 16 most of the services needed are provided by the Guernsey School's support services. Education for people with disabilities includes other complementary services such as speech therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, psychological counseling, and medical care. The Family Support Services may also help children with disabilities and their families with access to equipment, modifications of the home, developmental items and therapies that are not covered by insurance. The Service and Support Administrator (SSA) serves school aged children with disabilities through linkage with the following services:
    - Mental health services.
    - + Behavioral health services.
    - Recreational activities.
    - Respite care.
    - Summer camps.
  - Transition Services for people with disabilities age 16 to 22 The Service and Support Administrator (SSA) supports persons with disability and their respective families with developing skills for self-determination, preference for housing, education after high school, and development of job skills. The SSA ensures linkage and connection with Partnerships with Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (State of Ohio, n.d.).

- Adulthood Services for people with disabilities age 22 and up The Service and Support Administrator (SSA) focuses on the person's independence by assessing needs and setting goals to live well. The interventions focus on aging and retirement. Examples of services include:
  - + Home-maker personal care.
  - + Adult day services.
  - + Vocational habilitation services.
  - Transportation.
  - + Personal care.
  - + Community inclusion.
  - + Training in self-determination.
  - Health and wellness activities.
  - + Employment services.
  - + Vocational services.
  - Transportation services.
- Adult Services for people with disabilities 65 and up The Service and Support
  Administrator (SSA) focuses on helping people with disabilities with awareness and
  engagement related to aging and retirement. Assistance is provided on the following:
  - + Retirement needs.
  - + Nursing home screenings.
  - + Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) orders.
  - + Burial plans.
  - Habilitation services includes centralized services by certified providers that will guide and support persons with disabilities about socialization programs, volunteering programs, and health and wellness activities.
  - Residential services The Service and Support Administrator (SSA) will assist with in-home and remote supports; shared living; group homes; and intermediate care facilities.

- Access and education about community resources The Guernsey County Board of Developmental Disabilities provides comprehensive list of community resources to meet specific needs of people with disabilities who reside in Guernsey County. Examples of information about resources include but not limited to:
  - + Camps.
  - + Respite services.
  - + Schools.
  - + Behavioral services.
  - Autism schools and scholarship.
  - Diagnoses-related information.
  - + Adaptive/Sensory information.
  - Medical programs and services.

The OhioHealth Cancer Care offers comprehensive care from preventive screenings to treatment, chemotherapy, and immunotherapy.
    - Infusion services
    - · Radiation treatment and radiology physicians

  - C 2.2. OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center Emergency and Trauma Care located at 1341 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725.

OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center Maternity Care (Childbirth Center) During the perinatal period, the obstetrician/gynecologist and other advanced practice providers ensure that the mother and baby receive personalized care, comfort, security, and education. The Childbirth Center at Southeastern Medical Center is a Level 1 Perinatal Center, we provide referrals and transports for women with high-risk pregnancies and babies born with serious conditions who requires higher level of care.

- C 2.7. OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center Neuroscience physicians and providers are experts in treating patients with brain and spine conditions. The OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center Neuroscience Clinics are located at 1201 Neal Avenue, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. Patients have access to the following services:
  - Computerized axial tomography
  - Electroencephalography (EEG)
  - Electromyography (EMG)
  - Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI)
- C 2.8. OhioHealth Physician Group Orthopedics treats orthopedic injuries and conditions.

  OhioHealth's orthopedic surgeons repair complex fractures, perform joint replacements; reconstruct injured limbs. The surgery team collaborates with the rehabilitation and physical therapy teams to ensure successful path to recovery. The OhioHealth Physician Group Orthopedic Surgery is located at 1230 Clark Street Suite A, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. Examples of orthopedic services include:
  - Shoulder, hip, knee, ankle, hand, and wrist care.
  - Non-surgical procedures.
  - Minimally invasive, arthroscopic joint repair.
  - Total knee, shoulder, and hip replacements.
  - Orthopedic trauma fracture care.

OhioHealth Physician Group Podiatric Surgery provides comprehensive care and diagnosis for foot and ankle injuries or conditions, including bunions, diabetic or nonhealing wounds, infections, flat feet, and warts. The OhioHealth team also specializes in reconstructive surgery and deformity correction so patients can get back on their feet.

- C 2.11. OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care The OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care Cambridge is located at 1210 Clark Street, Cambridge, Ohio 43725. The OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care Caldwell is located at 18125 Woodsfield Road, Caldwell, Ohio 43724. The OhioHealth Physician Group Primary Care offers reliable, convenient care for everything from minor illnesses and injuries to the routine management of chronic health conditions like diabetes or asthma. Examples of programs and services include:

  - Alternative medicine and integrated medicine.
  - Comprehensive physical examinations for all ages.

A community health worker or care coordinator visits people's homes and determine their social determinants of health needs and address them accordingly.

In Ohio, USDA partners with the Ohio Department of Aging. The SFMNP gives \$50 benefit to low-income older adults so they could buy eligible, locally grown produce at participating farmers' markets. Participants of the SFMNP are age 60 and above who reside in the follow. ing Counties: Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum, or Tuscarawas County. The participants household income must be within 185% of the federal poverty level (Area Agency on Aging Region 9, Inc., 2023).

  - C 3.3. OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center Childbirth Center offers family-centered care and parent-infant bonding, skin-to-skin contact, rooming-in services, and breastfeeding education. The Childbirth Center is comprised of the Labor and Delivery Unit and the Mother and Baby Unit. The Childbirth Center is a Level 1 Perinatal Center, which has the ability to refer and transport women with high-risk pregnancies. Additionally, babies born with serious conditions may be transported to higher level of care that is available at The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center, Nationwide Children's Hospital, and Riverside Methodist Hospital, and tertiary centers at the Akron/Canton area.
  - C 3.4. Help Me Grow Home Visiting Programs offers pregnant women and postpartum women and their young children with home visiting services. Home visiting services are provided during prenatal care, Newborn to 3 months and 3 months to 3 years. In Guernsey County, the Help Me Grow program is coordinated by the Guernsey County Board of Developmental Disabilities, located at 60770 Southgate Road, Byesville, Ohio 43723.
    - Cambridge-Guernsey County Health Department provide home visiting services.
    - The Guernsey, Monroe, and Noble (GMN) Tri-County Community Action Commission home visiting services.
  - C 3.5. Guernsey County Family and Children First Council helps coordinate services for children and families by eliminating redundancies and consolidating resources for effective benefit.
    - **Early Intervention** provides coordinated services to parents of eligible children under age 3, with developmental delays. Young children perform their best in familiar settings.
    - Multi-System Youth includes children who require services from more than one agency. These youth need to avail of services from the Guernsey County Children Services, Guernsey County Board of Developmental Disabilities, agencies addressing mental health and addiction, juvenile justice system. Identified multi-system youth may need to be under the custody of the Guernsey County Children Services to ensure the best outcome.

- Wrap-around approach engages children and youth with the highest levels of mental health needs.
- Creative Options uses partnerships to support children from birth to age 21 with multiple needs. The Guernsey County Family and Children First Council assist in referring children to wraparound services and assisting with residential placement options.
- C 3.6. Cambridge-Guernsey County Health Department will provide the universal nurse home visiting program through Family Connects International (Family Connects, n.d.). Families will have a nurse home visit within three weeks after they bring their family home. Every new mother and their family will have a nurse visit at their home to find out about their needs and connecting them to local agencies.

- **D 2.** The demographic data of the Guernsey County population was obtained from the Ohio Department of Development (n.d.). See **Section B**.
- **D 3.** Pertinent health data from Ohio's 2019 State Health Assessment and the 2022 Online State Health Assessment (Ohio Department of Health, 2022.). See **Appendix A.**
- D 4. Pertinent health and health-related data for Guernsey County, Ohio versus State of Ohio, and United States (County Health Rankings, 2024; Ohio Department of Health, 2022); Ohio Department of Health (2023). See Appendix B.

No information gaps were identified that may impact the ability to assess health needs during the 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment process.

# E. The Significant Health Needs of the Community

### **Summary of Findings from Appendix Table 2.**

In 2020, 15% of adults in Ohio considered themselves in fair or poor health compared to 12% of adults in the United States. There was a 3.9% reduction in the percent of Ohio adults with fair or poor health in 2020 compared to 2017. From 2018-2020, in Ohio, 8,700 years of life were lost due to deaths of Ohioans under age 75 per 100,000 people compared to 7,300 years of life lost due to deaths in the United States.

#### Summary of Findings from Appendix Table 16.

Cancer Cases and Deaths in Ohio (2016-2020) – Cancer is the second leading cause of death in Ohio. Cancer accounts for 1 in 5 deaths in Ohio. Four out of 10 people in Ohio will be diagnosed with cancer during their lifetime.

New Invasive Cancer Cases in Guernsey County (2016-2020) – On average, 269 new invasive cancer cases per year were diagnosed among Guernsey County residents. The top 5 new invasive cancer cases in Guernsey County were lung and bronchus cancer, prostate cancer, colon and rectum cancer, breast (female), and bladder. These top five cancers represented 56% of all new invasive cancer cases. The cancer incidence rate (new cases) for all sites/types of cancer in Guernsey County was higher compared to Ohio and United States rate. Males in Guernsey County, Ohio and U.S. had slightly higher cancer incidence rates (based on new cancer cases) compared to females. Whites have higher cancer incidence rates compared to Blacks.

Cancer Deaths in Guernsey County (2016-2020) — On average, 104 cancer deaths per year were diagnosed among Guernsey County residents. The top 5 leading causes of cancer death in Guernsey County were lung and bronchus cancer, colon and rectum cancer, pancreatic cancer, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, and prostate cancer. These top 5 causes of cancer deaths represented 57% of all cancer deaths. The cancer death rate for all sites/types of cancer in Guernsey County was higher compared to Ohio and United States rates. Males in Guernsey County, Ohio and United States had higher cancer death rates compared to females. There were no marked differences in death rates between Whites and Blacks in Ohio and United States. There is no data on cancer death rates among Blacks in Guernsey County.

#### Priority Health Need 1: Drug Addiction and Substance Use

- DASU 1. Continue collaboration with CHOICES Anti-Drug Coalition of Guernsey County Community stakeholders at Guernsey County set up a collaborative to address increasing rates of substance use and addiction in Guernsey County. CHOICES stands for Community, Hope, Opportunity, Independence, Change, Empowerment, Success. CHOICES aims to address: (a) prevention measures, (b) substance use risk factors, (c) protective factors, (d) strategic planning to promote healthy living, (e) implementation of community-wide initiatives. The community stakeholders who are actively involved with CHOICES Anti-Drug Coalition of Guernsey County include (but not limited to):
  - Guernsey County Sheriff's Office The Sheriff's Office's mission is "to enforce the laws of

## OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's Impacts related to DASU - 1

The CHOICES Anti-Drug Coalition of Guernsey County decided to discontinue their community efforts in May 2023. Hence the outcomes and impact related to OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's participation in the CHOICES Coalition are limited. In lieu of reporting the impacts of the CHOICES Anti-Drug Coalition of Guernsey County, OhioHealth is reporting the number and percent of patients served in the inpatient, Emergency Department, ambulatory and outpatient settings who have diagnoses of Mental, Behavioral and Neurodevelopmental Disorders (ICD-10-CM: F01-F99).

The CHOICES Anti-Drug Coalition tackled the following: (a) education and awareness about opiates and non-opiates; (b) distribution of naloxone to prevent death from opiate overdose; (c) partnerships with local school districts to educate school-aged children and adolescents about the negative impacts of substance use; and (d) distribution of medication collection bags to farmers and rural residents so they could safely get rid of expired or unused prescription medications.

The OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center routinely provides health care services to patients with diagnoses of Mental, Behavioral and Neurodevelopmental Disorders (ICD-10-CM: F01-F99) (Appendix Table 19). When necessary, patients with these diagnoses are referred to community agencies that provide higher levels of mental and behavioral health care services to ensure well-coordinated care.

The count and percent of patients served by the OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center inpatient, Emergency Department, OhioHealth ambulatory facilities or OhioHealth Physician Group outpatient clinics are shown in **Appendix Table 20 and Appendix Table 21** in Fiscal Years 2023 and 2024, respectively.

- DASU 2. Continue collaboration with Noble County CARES (Community Access, Resources, Education, and Services) Noble County CARES is a regional coalition of hospital, health centers, mental health, and addiction agencies, in Southeast Ohio to provide community access, resources, education, and services to all community members in Noble County, Guernsey County, and southeast Ohio counties. The Noble County CARES community partners include (but not limited to):
  - **Noble County Health Department** —Collaboration with AllWell to provide substance use and addiction resources within the community, provides education, awareness, and prevention to school-aged children in both schools located in Noble County.
  - AllWell Behavioral Health Services Provides assessment and evaluation, community support
    and case management, peer support, consultation and education, counseling and therapy, overall
    prevention and wellness, Medication-Assisted Treatment.
  - Noble County Board of Developmental Disabilities programs and services including supports for children and adults, transition planning, and Employment first.
  - Noble County Veteran's Office Provides temporary financial assistance and transportation to Veterans
  - Noble County Family and Children First Council provides substance use prevention awareness for students through education curriculum and planned educational activities.
  - Local Law Enforcement committed to excellence in law enforcement and are dedicated to the
    people, traditions, and diversity of Noble County.
  - Caldwell Church of Nazarene Pastor represents faith-based programs within the community.
  - **Noble County Sheriff** leads Noble County Law Enforcement by providing services with understanding, compassion, and integrity.
  - Noble County probation officers Implements and tracks compliance with court-ordered services, terms, and programs, including substance abuse treatment. Administers drug and alcohol testing on probationers.
  - Noble County Family Violence Council "provides and promotes a collaborative effort to arrange non-discriminatory services in areas of advocacy, support, prevention, and education for victims of domestic violence, their families, and the Noble County Community at large."
  - Ohio State University Extension provides services including 4-H development, agriculture and natural resources, community development, and family and consumer sciences.

Focus areas of Noble County CARES Coalition include but not limited to drug prevention community education, engagement and empowerment to continue to promote equitable access to community programs and services, hence promoting healthy and well communities. - DASU 4. Continue collaboration with the "Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies" program the counselor-preventions specialist from Cambridge-Guernsey Health Department links pregnant women or women who delivered within the last 12 months with resources to support the health and safety of mom and baby in various aspects of substance use recovery. The counselor- prevention specialist provides services in Guernsey and Noble counties (Cambridge-Guernsey Health Department, 2022). The counselor- prevention specialist goes to SEORMC Childbirth Center to recruit participants and provide the following services:
  - Trauma informed services includes case management and assessment, substance dependency and prevention support, and infant bonding techniques.
  - **Education** includes reproductive health and birth control, neonatal abstinence syndrome, infant Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training assistance, and support with attending medical appointments and court hearings.
  - Referrals includes social services, employment, relapse prevention, detox facilities, and Naloxone programs.

## OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's Impacts related to "Continuing collaboration with the "Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies" program (DASU – 4).

In Fiscal Year 2023 and 2024, there were 424 and 440 deliveries at the OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center. As part of the materials and resources, the OhioHealth team includes information about the Cambridge Guernsey County Health Department programs for mothers, babies, and families (Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies, n.d.).

**Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies** – ensures safety and healthy pregnancy for mother and baby while ensuring families receive care and support throughout their recovery. The Healthy Moms and Healthy Babies links pregnant women or women who have recently delivered in the past year with resources to support the health and safety of the mother and baby during recovery. The goal is to provide confidential environment in which patients can seek education, referrals, and support. Patients are treated with dignity and respect throughout their recover. It promotes resilience while utilizing person first language across our continuum of care for substance use disorders.

The Healthy Moms Healthy Babies provide trauma informed services and education:

- Case management and assessment
- Substance dependency and prevention supports
- Cribs for Kids Program and Safe Sleep
- Infant Bonding techniques
- Reproductive health and birth control
- Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome
- Stages of pregnancy
- · Breastfeeding and postpartum challenges
- Infant cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training assistance
- Infant care items
- Infant massage
- Community presentations
- Support attending medical appointments and court hearings

- Parenting skills
- The staff from Healthy Moms and babies provide information and referral for: (a) treatment; (b) medical care; (c) residential treatment; (d) employment; (e) education; (f) social services; (g) housing; (h) relapse prevention; (i) detox facilities; (j) drug overdose education and Naloxone program; and (k) infant development and learning resources.

**Bridges to Wellness** – partners with Access Tusc to offer Bridges Wellness, which is a program that connects families to local resources to help them become healthier. The families can access the services of the community care coordinator to address their needs. Women and children are provided the education and support to pregnant women to help promote healthy pregnancies and postpartum period.

Car Seat Program – the Health Department offers the Ohio Buckles Buckeyes Car Seat Program. The child safety seats are purchased by the Ohio Department of Health. The health department's Certified Child Passenger Safety Technician assists patients with child safety seat questions, installation, and checking of safety. The Ohio Buckles Buckeyes Car Seat Program (a) Guernsey County resident; (b) custody of a child between birth to 8 years old and or more than 32 weeks pregnant; (c) eligible for WIC or Medicaid card; (d) WIC income-eligible children may receive one car seat every 3 years if parents or legal guardians register for class or pass the quiz; and (e) willing to complete an Ohio Buckles Buckeyes education session. A parent or guardian is eligible to receive a child restraint system-convertible or booter seat after completion of an online educational session on proper use and installation of the child restraints, as well as Ohio car seat laws. Completion of the online class and an appointment to complete paperwork and receive hands-on assistance completes the program.

Children with Medical Handicaps – a health care program of the Ohio Department of Health that links families of children with special health care needs to a network of quality providers and help families obtain payment for services their child needs. There are three ways by which the Bureau of Children with Medical Handicaps (BCMH) helps Guernsey County residents: (a) diagnostic program; (b) treatment program; and (c) service coordination program. The Children with Medical Handicaps allows eligibility of children with (a) AIDS; (b) cancer; (c) cerebral palsy; (d) cleft lip or palate; (e) cystic fibrosis; (f) congenital heart disease; (g) chronic lung disease; (h) diabetes; (i) hearing loss; (j) hemophilia; (k) juvenile arthritis; (l) metabolic disorders; (m) scoliosis; (n) severe vision disorders; (o) sickle cell disease; and (p) spina bifida.

**Cribs for Kids®** – has a mission of preventing infant sleep-related deaths by educating parents and caregivers on safe sleep practices for babies and providing portable cribs to families who cannot afford safe place for babies to sleep.

**Access to immunizations** – the health department provides immunizations following the guidelines of the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention.

In addition to collaborations and support of the Cambridge Guernsey County Health Department's programs for maternal, infant and child health, the OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center representatives participated in the Guernsey County Board of Developmental Disabilities "Community Baby Shower" that was held on October 13, 2022; May 25, 2023, and April 4, 2024. The Community Baby Shower was aimed at providing empowerment and support to expectant mothers as well as provide them with education about various community resources that provides programs and services that aims to promote maternal, child and family health and wellbeing.

The OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center's team members also participated in the Noble County Community Baby Shower on May 11, 2023. The baby shower was aimed at providing education on health and wellness of mothers, babies, and their families as well as the awareness of various community resources to support maternal, infant and child health like the Women, Infant and Children (WIC) program.

- DASU 5. Continue the services of a case manager/substance use navigator The SEORMC case manager/substance use navigator assists patients in the Emergency Department by providing education, referral, and linkages. The substance use navigator also helps patients identify a primary care provider and connecting patients with mental health and addiction agencies including Muskingum Valley Health Center (MVHC), AllWell Behavioral Health Solution, Superior Med, and Medical Associates of Cambridge.
  - Muskingum Valley Health Center services include (but not limited to) behavioral Health, addiction Services, and Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
  - AllWell Behavioral Health Solutions includes (but not limited to) assessment and
    evaluation, community support and case management, peer support, consultation and
    education, counseling and therapy, overall prevention and wellness, and Medication-Assisted
    Treatment (MAT).
  - Superior Med services include (but not limited to) primary care services and referral of
    patients to mental and behavioral health agencies.
  - Medical Associates of Cambridge services include (but not limited to) social services and
    education on community resources regarding substance abuse and addiction.

## OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center Impacts Related to "Continuing the services of a case manager/substance use navigator (DASU – 5)"

Appendix Tables 51 show the number of patients served by the Emergency Department who had diagnoses related to drug abuse and/or substance use. The OhioHealth Southeastern Medical Center team represented by any one of the following least one of the following employees, case manager, substance use navigator, social worker, provided emotional support, engagement, and referral to either the community mental or behavioral health agencies or OhioHealth providers when necessary. Examples of community agencies include (a) Muskingum Valley Heath Center; (b) Allwell Behavioral Health Solutions. The OhioHealth care manager, substance use navigator or social worker are knowledgeable about the many contracted agencies of the Muskingum Area Mental Health and Recovery Services Board serving Coshocton, Guernsey, Morgan, Muskingum, Noble, and Perry Counties (Muskingum MHRSB, 2019).
